#### TO TELEPHONE CUSTOMERS IN THE FARMINGTON ZONE

Work is now under way to provide the Farmington Zone with an improved dial telephone service in the simmer of 1955. This service will be provided on a one and two party basis only. At the time of the dial cutover, we propose to withdraw the "Local Zone" service offering and to introduce a new "Message Rate Extended Area" service. This will provide the Farmington customers with a choice of either message rate or flat rate "Extended Area" service.

The classes of service that would be available and the rates that would apply under the proposed arrangement are shown below in comparison with present service offerings and rates. Column 1 lists the rates for present service offerings while Column 3 lists the rates for proposed service offerings.
