Education Through Fine Arts

Elementary Instrumental Music Taught In Grades Four Through Six

The instrumental music program of the Farmington Township elementary schools reaches students in grades four through six. The purpose of the activity is to provide, first, to give all students in these grades the opportunity to learn fundamental techniques and theory related to the playing of a band instrument; second, to provide students showing sufficient interest and aptitude the instruction necessary to allow them to play a band instrument creditably enough to enter Junior High instrumental music classes.

The first purpose of the program outlined above is carried out by means of instruction on the song flute, a small plastic instrument which approximates the fingering on many reed instruments. The second purpose is carried out by means of instruction on legitimate band instruments. Most of the students own their own instruments.

Last fall three hundred and fifteen students took advantage of the program. Many of these people are now studying band instruments, having finished the song flute part of the course.

On Friday, April 1, at the Farmington High School auditorium on School Street, the art, vocal music and instrumental music departments will combine to present a program entitled "Education Through Fine Arts."

At that time, the 70-piece Elementary Advanced Band will present several numbers illustrating the type of work the department has been doing this year. Also, the song flute people will play a selection, and they play the same number on regular band instru-

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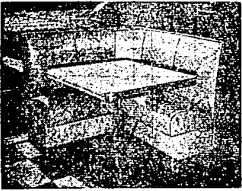
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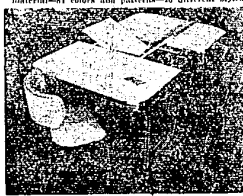
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
