Several Local Boy Scout Units To Participate In Scout-O-Rama April 16

Boy Scout Troops of this area will have a big part in the Ottawa District, Clinton Valley Council, second annual Scout-O-Rama, to be held at the Walled Lake Junior High School on Saturday, April 16, from 2:00 to 9:30 p.m.

Featured at the Scout-O-Rama will be a display of live animals and snakes, a signal tower of rustic construction, a real troop "check-out" model aircraft, and homemade fire extinguishers, instructions on arrow making, railroading, radio broadcasting, armor making, bicycle repairing, leather tooling, fly tying, and photography processing along with displays will also be given. All of this and much more will be available to the public under one roof at the Scout-O-Rama.

One of the highlights of this year's program will be the setting up of a typical campsite on real dirt brought in from the gymnasium floor.

A number of units from this area will take part in the big displaying facilities. Troop 35 will display woodwork and conserve; Explorer Post 55 will display bicycle repair; Troop 48 a section in tooling and fabricating leather work; and Explorer Post 48 a section on hunting and fishing, demonstrating the art of fly tying. Troop 45 will demonstrate training in rope and rustic work and tent-peg making. From the southern division and Cub Pack 45 will display a model railroad, theme for the month.

Troop 110 will demonstrate photographic processing and developing and Explorer Post 109 will show knots and jashings. Explorers of 109 will also display their signal tower of rustic construction. Explorers of 110 of boys will display projects in nature study and animal husbandry. Troop 109 will display a typical campsite.

Scout merit badge demonstrations and Cub and Explorer exhibits will be shown continuously and will represent the work of 27 units of the "Lake" District. Stage shows will be presented at 7:30 p.m. and 8:15 p.m. and will feature talent from all units. Among the attractions will be a rhythm band; an accordion soloist; an Indian ceremony; "Ottawa District Liberators" and many other performances.

Refreshments will be served by two Walled Lake Troops. General chairman of the program is Earl Gruber of Westacres. Otis Walton of Green Lake will be master of ceremonies and Robert Williams of Farmington, stage director. Tickets for the Scout-O-Rama are now available and may be purchased from any member of Scout, Cub or Explorer unit.

Approximately half the proceeds will be retained by the unit selling the tickets and the other half will be turned over to District Headquarters in order to finance the activities of two Explorer Scouts to the International Scout Jamboree at Niagara Falls, Ontario, this summer.
