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
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Education Through Fine Arts
Vocal Music To Be Important Part Of Fine Arts Program Set For April 1
Educators have discovered that when music is a vital part of the life in a classroom, all learning is enriched. Music tends to refresh children and helps to create a happy group atmosphere that makes them more cooperative and eager to learn. For this reason, music is included in the general curriculum in the Farmington Township Elementary Schools and presented to the children as a part of each day's work by the classroom teachers.
Vocal music in the elementary school has five basic elements: singing, listening, responding to rhythm, creating, and playing instruments of various kinds. The major part of the elementary music program for the average child is singing. The school provides songs to accompany the basic music text books as well as other recorded songs. These help the teachers and provide variety for the singing program. The recordings can also be used as a part of the listening program. There is also a rapidly growing library of records of all types, countries, and composers for richer listening experiences.
Singing games, square dances, folk dances from many countries, individual rhythmic responses to music which suggests running, skipping, walking, sliding, swinging, hopping, and bending, and flying bands are some of the activities included in rhythm response. The children often create their own rhythm responses and their own song interpretations, as well as the words or tunes for original songs. Or they make up an accompaniment for a song or create original composition, and play it on rhythm instruments such as triangles, tambourines, drums, rhythm sticks, bells, or instruments that they have made themselves.
In this fashion all five elements of the vocal music program are overlapped and integrated with each other and with the entire elementary curriculum.
The "Education Through Fine Arts" program to be presented Friday, April 1, is designed to give parents an indication of what is going on in Fine Arts in the classrooms of the Farmington Township Elementary Schools. Robert Benjamin, elementary art consultant; Lloyd Smith, elementary band consultant; and Jeanne Wells, elementary music consultant, have worked with Emma Soldel, Donald Hossler and Kenneth Lachman, elementary principals; Minnie Zielke, elementary school coordinator; and the entire teaching staff of the elementary schools, to prepare a program that will be as representative as possible of the activities included in each of the three areas of the Fine Arts program in the Farmington Township Elementary Schools.
The program will be presented in the Farmington Gymnasium. Art exhibits will be on display at 7:15 and may be viewed until 7:45 when the band will play the "Star Spangled Banner" starting the regular program. Further opportunity for viewing the exhibits has been arranged from the conclusion of the concert until 8:30. Over 300 students will be participating in the program, and the art work of hundreds of other elementary pupils will be on display.

NOTED CONTRALTO TO APPEAR IN DETROIT APRIL 6
