MICHIGAN VOTERS will be asked April 4 to install in the state

constitution a plan to help local school districts finance new buildings with a \$100,000,000 bond issue. It was written by educators who knew the potential problems and enacted by legislators who were convinced it existed.

The legislature is to be complemented by putting the proposal on the ballot. If approved by the voters, it will help the most seriously distressed school districts and help education.

After several conferences, the proposed bond issue was drafted first in Oakland County and was shipped into the legislature under the sponsorship of Senator William S. Broomfield (R-Royal Oak).

Districts will certify their needs to the state and get approval to go on bond issue. Anything that cannot be covered by the local 13-mill tax will be picked up by the state.

To get the state's money back, the districts would be required to continue the 13-mill levy after their needs drop below that point, using the excess over a 30-year period to repay the state.

He said the \$100,000,000 "probably would not be all used and that the first year's lending program would affect 40 districts, most of them in the southeastern section of the state, and the first year's loans would approximate \$3,000,000.


Ten years ago (April 5, 1945)
