

Plan Ground Breaking Ceremony For Franklin Church Easter Sunday

A special "Upper Room" setting will greet worshippers attending the traditional Maundy Thursday Communion Service at Franklin Community Church April 7 at 7:30 p.m.

Adding to the importance of the occasion will be the reception on Communion together with the Girls' Confirmation class, to be received into membership of the church at the ground-breaking service Easter Day. The Chancel Choir will sing.

On Good Friday the church will participate in the Tre-Orc services of the Birmingham Council of Churches. Mr. Sears will conduct the first hour of service to be held at First Baptist Church, and will preach at the 2:00 p.m. service at the Embury Methodist Church.

At 7 a.m. Easter Day, members and friends of the church will gather at the site of the new church on Franklin Village Green for a Sunrise/Ground-Breaking Service. Opening with Easter trumpeting, the brief service will hear the Chancel Choir sing Francis' "O Lord Most Holy," with Miss Roberta Spiller handling the solo portion, and the combined choir's present Wesley's "Easter Hallelujah."

Participating in the actual ground-breaking will be members of the building committee,

workers in the campaign, heads of organizations, and all who attend. The Rev. Robert J. Sears, minister, will preside and will receive the church members of the confirmation class. A huge wooden cross will dominate the setting, erected under the direction of Norman Kessler. Should the weather prove undesirable, the service will start in the church.

Because there has been insufficient time to complete all work, drawings and engineering studies essential to construction, actual work on the new church will be delayed several weeks.

Following the service, an Easter breakfast will be held in the Community Hall with reservations to be made by contacting Mrs. Ralph Woodburn.

Duplicate services at 9:30 and 10:45 a.m. will hear Mr. Sears preach on "Finding Christ Surprisingly Close." The chancel choir will sing "O Lord Most Holy" at all services, adding "Great Glibber" from the famed "Twelfth Mass" at the 9:30 service, joining the Junior choir the next hour in repeating the "Easter Hallelujah." The Junior choir will also present Caldwell's "Blessed Easter Morn." at the 10:45 hour.

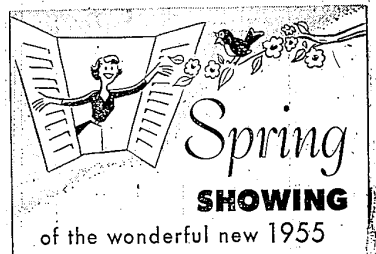

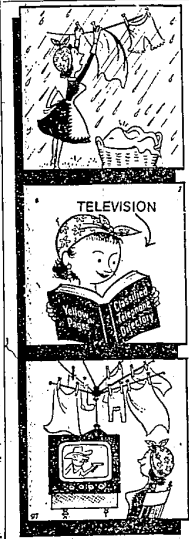
