Instructions In Gardening, Displays To Be Featured During Flower Show

April 22 - 2 p.m., "Horticultural Therapy," Mrs. G. Arthur Ridge of Battle Creek, state horticultural therapy-chairman of Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan. Program with the theme, "Garden Magic," sponsored by North Rose-Garden Club.

April 23 - 2 p.m., "Fashions in Garden Lighting," illustrated demonstration by Miss Mary Taepke.

Farmington P.T.A. Meeting To Focus On Counseling

The program for the last meeting of this school year of the Farmington High School P. T. A. will be on counseling, and should be of special interest to both parents and students. The meeting will be held Tuesday, April 19, at the restaurant on Thomas Street.

Questions like "What will high school be like?" "What kind of work shall I seek?" and "Should I go to college?" arise in the minds of young people as they enter and progress in high school. Parents are often at a loss as to how to advise their children. This program has been tailored to help parents and students answer these questions.

G. V. Harrison, high school principal, will discuss the transition from junior to senior high school. The discussion will be helpful in the selecting of high school courses.

Mr. Lillian Monash of the Michigan Employment Security Commission will outline developments in vocational guidance and discuss employment possibilities. Dr. Edward C. Roebler, director of counseling at the University of Michigan, will point out guide posts for those planning to enter college. Dr. Roebler is well known for his work in this field.

The facilities of his department are available by appointment to high school students who would like help in determining the type of work in which they are best suited.

"This meeting should be a must," stated Ivan Clarke, president of the High School P. T. A., "for parents and students who are interested in getting information on intelligently planning a high school program and selecting a vocation."

There will also be interesting exhibits by the social science and mathematics departments. The exhibits will be representative of work done in classes taught by Miss Colmer, Mr. Gilson and Mrs. Krill.

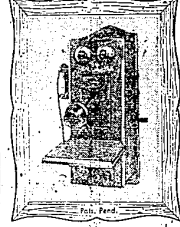
