**School Candidate Petitions Available**

Prospective candidates for election to either the Farmington or Clarenceville School Boards may now secure nominating petitions at the respective Board of Education offices, officials announced this week.

The petitions must be filed with the Board secretary in the particular school district on or before 4:00 p.m. Saturday, May 14. The Annual School Elections are to be held on Monday, June 13. Nominating petitions must be signed by not less than 50 nor more than 75 qualified electors residing in the given school district. A person may not sign petitions for more candidates than the number of offices to be filled at the June 13 election.

Two Board Trustees are to be elected in the Farmington School District this year with one to be elected in the Clarenceville District. The terms of Mrs. Chester Downing, secretary of the Farmington Board, and Douglas Hamann, secretary of the Clarenceville Board, will expire in July. The term of Fred Bailey, president of the Clarenceville Board, will also expire this summer. Newly elected Board officials will serve for periods of three years each.

Nominating petitions for the Farmington election may be secured at the Board office on the second floor of the Junior High School building on Thomas Street or from Mrs. Downing, secretary, 28570 Middlebelt. Persons interested in entering the Clarenceville election may secure petitions at the Board office adjacent to the high school on Middlebelt or from James Nicholas, secretary, 19344 Irenwood.

**CITY COMPLETES ROAD TREATMENT PROGRAM**

Work was completed last week on the application of dust-laying calcium chloride on all gravel roads in the city, James Tennant, Manager, reported Monday.

A total of 12 tons of calcium chloride was applied at a complete cost of less than \$400. Work on the project was done by the Public Works Department. Tennant stated that a total of four applications of calcium chloride can be applied for approximately the same cost as one application of asphalt emulsion. Plans are being made for at least three more applications this season.

The heaviest treatment was applied on Powers Road, Shawmut and Alta Loma because of the volume of traffic. Residential streets throughout the city, as well as the public parking lots, received the lighter application.

**LAMP SHOULD ADD CHARM BUT NOT AT COST OF LIGHT**

A table lamp may add charm to your living room, but if it does not give enough light, it does not serve its real purpose.

To remedy this light problem, Evelyn Zwemer, of the home management and child development department at Michigan State College, suggests using the R-40 "white" light bulb.

She explains that it is more expensive than ordinary bulbs because of an extra coating of powder on the inside and so is worth the extra cost.

This coating makes for greater diffusion of light and often eliminates the need for a bowl in the lamp. Miss Zwemer explains that the more light is diffused, the better the quality of light. The "white" light bulb also has less glare when looking at it directly than an ordinary bulb.

To use the new "white" light bulb you may have to remove the metal support for the shade and replace it with a more heavy support. For good lighting, the base of table lamps should be 25 inches or more in height and open-top shades should have a bottom diameter of 15 inches.

The new "white" light bulbs are available in 60, 100, and 150 watts and a 50-100-150 watt three-way bulb. They can also be used in plug-in wall lamps and the small floor type lamps.

**CPL. G. FULCHER TAKES PART IN DIVISION EXERCISE**

Army Corporal Gerald W. Fulcher, whose wife, Janet, lives in Farmington, recently completed a phase of the spring training exercises held by the 4th Infantry Division in Germany. He is the son of Earl Fulcher of 35100 Grand River.

The "Top" division's spring maneuvers are part of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's preparations for the defense of Western Europe.

Cpl. G. Fulcher, an instrument specialist in Headquarters Company of the division's 2nd Battalion, entered the Army in June, 1953, and arrived overseas in December.

**ACRE OF DAFFODILS NOW IN BLOOM AT CRANBROOK GARDEN**

Ten thousand yellow daffodils are now in bloom in the Gardens of Cranbrook House, Bloomfield Hills.

The Gardens, offering this "golden acre" are a sight to see, and are open to the public.

The daffodils were planted two years ago in memory of Mr. and Mrs. George G. Booth, founders of the six Cranbrook institutions. They are located on a sloping hillside which is part of the 40-acre Cranbrook and park are surrounded by the Cranbrook House, where the Booths lived until their deaths a few years ago.

April and May visitors to the Gardens will see early spring flowers, including flowering cherries and crab, forsythia, iris and tree peony.

In addition to the flowers, the Gardens are decorated with replicas of French, Italian and Chinese sculptures and fountains, as well as carvings found at Pompeii and art works commissioned expressly for the grounds.

As in the past, the Gardens will be operated by alumni of Kingswood and Cranbrook Schools. Open hours are Saturday and Sunday from 2 to 6 p.m. Garden clubs and other organizations may make advance arrangements for special weekday tours.

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**Cancer Can Be Stopped If Diagnosed Early**

The secret of successful cancer treatment is early diagnosis. How can this be done? Mostly it depends on the individual. . . on you, said Frederick C. Ziem of Pontiac in his talk to the board members, volunteer workers and guests at the American Cancer Society rally dinner Wednesday evening at Devon Gables.

Ziem is chairman of Cancer Crusade Month being promoted during April by the North Oakland County Unit of the South-eastern Michigan Division.

Ziem called the group's attention to the fact that in 1954 one out of every four persons died of cancer and that the purpose of this Crusade Month is to impress upon people that this ratio is entirely unnecessary.

"I am told that with a projected population of 500,000 this year in Oakland County, 125,000 will develop cancer and that 70,000 of them will die of cancer at the present rate. . . but that one third of these can be avoided if people will stop being afraid of cancer. . . will heed the savior danger signals. . . will go to their physicians for regular examinations. Knowledge is power, is life itself, said Mr. Ziem.

"We are out of the fog, thanks to doctors, scientists and the work of volunteers, and Ziem can see all that knowledge being pooled and much progress being made toward conquering the dread disease of cancer.

"Be your own personal inspector. . . be a salesman and sell the subject to your friends of detecting early symptoms of cancer." Ziem exhorted.

Mrs. Edward W. Williams of Rochester, co-chairman for the educational crusade, spoke of the enthusiasm of the volunteer workers of the faith that research eventually will be rewarded.


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
