Bud Bryant, class of '49, has a teaching and coaching job at Southfield, starting next fall.

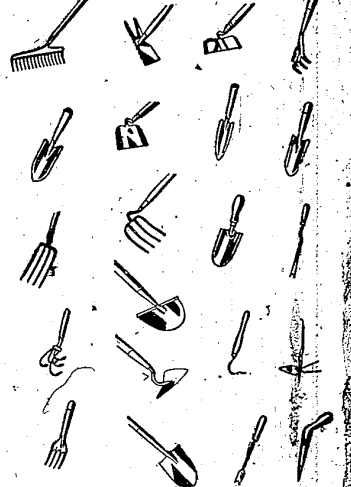
Frank Delmonter, class of '54, has joined the Navy. Frank left Friday, April 29, for Great Lakes Naval Training Center.
