Report Of Library Study Committee

 agreed that the Wilber site was preferable for the following reasons:
 1) It is larger than the Carlisle site, and could provide parking space for about 40 cars.
 2) It is a great advantage to have access from two thoroughfares.
 3) Since the State is to start on the new Grand River project this spring, most of the present traffic noise would be eliminated.
 4) The two houses could be sold without the land and moved off the property.
 5) A homebody to provide library service for the outlying Township areas could be obtained which would relieve parking, and make a smaller sized library feasible and practical.
 If the Carlisle property were sold and would produce \$2,000.00 net and the City would use the cash to pay the expenses of maintenance and operation. The property valuation of the Township is rapidly increasing. Last year it was about 22 million dollars; next year it will perhaps be 25 million dollars. On a valuation of 25 million dollars the tax would produce \$12,500.00 per year, while the tax levied by the City on a valuation of 3 million dollars would be \$2,500.00 of a total of the two municipalities of \$15,000.00 per year, to which the City would add the income from the land contracts of \$3,000.00 per year, or a total of \$18,000.00 per year. Compare this with the \$5,000.00 now received from City and Township appropriations, and you get some idea as to its efficacy with a larger library.
 It should be stated that there has been no Township tax assessed in some years. The Township is run by sales tax diversion money from the State. Practically all our tax money goes for schools. The school tax is high and will probably go higher. There is a natural reluctance to suggest a new tax for these reasons. Such a tax must be approved by the voters by ballot. This, however, is very small.
 On a property valuation of \$5,000.00, the tax would be \$2.50; on a \$10,000.00 valuation, it would be \$5.00. The approval of an increase in tax seems to be necessary to maintain staff and purchase books. There are fears that the voters will defeat such a proposition.
