PROGRESSIVE REDUCTION IN WORK ACCIDENTS RECORDED YEARLY IN U. S. A.

Progress of America's economy is generally described in glowing terms of expansion and productivity. One solid achievement frequently overlooked is progressive reduction in human cost - occupational accidents - in turning out goods and services. In 1954 accidents reached a post-war low in total number, and the all-time low with respect to fatalities involved in occupational pursuits. Last year there were an estimated 1,500,000 disabling injuries to American workers. This includes every accident severe enough to keep a worker off the job for as much as one shift. If converted into occupational accidents, only 230,000 of the total were suffered in manufacturing. Number of work injuries last year was lower than any year since 1930, and about the same as 1937. This is impressive because in those 17 years employment increased one-third and total physical output doubled. In other words, we had twice as much over all production with about the same number of injuries - or, half as many injuries per production unit. Fatal accident records are even more impressive. Deaths from work injuries in 1954 was the lowest ever recorded. There were 11,000 deaths due to work injuries last year, 2,000 of which occurred in manufacturing. Improvements in industrial safety did not come through chance. They result from continuous attention to the problem by business, employees, government, and organizations in the field of safety. Such favorable trends will encourage these groups to continue strenuous efforts to achieve even better safety records in the future.

A representative of Eberle Smith Associates appeared before the Board Thursday to discuss plans for the proposed addition by the Oxford School. (Continued from Page One) lives were \$100 for civil defense, \$1,400 for control of Dutch Elm Disease, and an additional \$1,000 for police car maintenance and replacement. The major reductions in expenditures were \$2,000 from the electrical expense in the water department, \$6,000 for new sewers and \$2,000 from the general equipment fund. In the bond issue section of the budget, the Council authorized the addition of \$25,000 to the \$50,000 special assessment item for paving to provide for the advancement of funds to construct sidewalks. The addition would increase the total bond issue proposal from \$175,000 to \$200,000. The other items in the proposal include \$175,000 for water mains and equipment and \$250,000 for a sewage treatment system. Tennant stated that he would refer the budget, on the basis of the suggestions made by the Council, and have it ready for final action at the May 16 meeting. It is expected that ordinances will be drafted for the proposed establishment of sewer and water service fees as well as the increase for installation of sewer and water taps.

MEAT IN BABY'S DIET PROVIDES NORMAL BLOOD

Meat may soon be added to baby's diet, even before he's three months old. The meat seems to aid the production of red blood cells, says Mary Lewis, associate professor of food and nutrition at Michigan State College. Young babies tend to have a sharp drop in the amount of hemoglobin in their blood during their first three months. The drop is normal, but it can be dangerous if it continues to the point where a baby becomes anemic. Since source of iron is meat, it is best to level it off before it goes too far, Miss Lewis points out. That source may be meat. Recent studies have shown that when meat is added to a baby's formula within his first three months, the sharp drop in hemoglobin is stopped. In fact, Miss Lewis says, the hemoglobin level even begins a slow upward climb. How do babies react to meat at such a nearly age? Miss Lewis indicates that a study shows the infants do well, ate well and came back hungry for more. The connection between iron and red blood cells, Miss Lewis explains, is that iron is one of the regulating factors in the production of the red cells. Iron from the daily diet is needed to give red blood cells their quota of hemoglobin. Hemoglobin, in turn, takes oxygen from the lungs and carries it out to the body cells. There it enables food energy to be used.
