RED CROSS, CIVIL DEFENSE ROLES IN DISASTER DEFINED

A statement of understanding between the Michigan Office of Civil Defense and the American National Red Cross defining the roles of each agency in natural and war-related disasters and their relationship in carrying out their respective assignments has been formally agreed upon by Governor G. J. Noyes...

In disasters resulting from enemy attack Civil Defense will exercise complete control of relief operations, including those of the Red Cross...

In disasters resulting from natural causes, such as tornadoes, floods, hurricanes and other catastrophes, the Red Cross will be responsible for meeting the well-known needs of disaster victims and will exercise administrative and financial control of its own operations.

In a disaster declared by the government to be an emergency, Civil Defense will be responsible for coordinating the activities of all agencies participating in relief operations. Under the agreement, Civil Defense will not expend funds for activities which are the responsibility of the Red Cross.
