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Name Pro, Advisor For Farmington Country Club

Seasoned Detroit golfer Jimmy Johnson has been signed to a three year contract as professional and advisor for the new Farmington Country Club. It was disclosed this week by Dr. Carl Swift, club president.

Johnson, who turned professional in 1942, served a year at Warren Valley Golf Course, eight years at Glen Oaks, and two years at Tam O'Shanter. He retired from his pro post to become a manufacturer's representative.

The club's driving range, in operation on West Twelve Mile Road near Haggerty, site of the new course, is being supervised by Johnson at the present time.

Officials stated that the proposed amendment will provide for the construction by the City of Farmington of interconnector sewers with connection to and treatment by the City of Detroit. In lieu of a self-contained treatment plant in Farmington. It will also provide that contract documents and construction plans be submitted to the State Department of Health for approval on or before April 1, 1956. The amendment also states that the city shall execute all necessary contracts for sewer construction and sewage treatment by the City of Detroit and in a reasonable length of time.

State Highway Painting Project Under Way, Aids Road Safety

The State Highway Department's annual pavement painting program is in full swing. Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler reports, "The department has eight paint crews at work in the Lower Peninsula counties and another eight ready to start work soon in the Upper Peninsula."

The pavement painting program is an important part of the Highway Department's work in controlling traffic movement and making highway travel as safe as possible.

The paint crews are painting white and black center lines and yellow caution lines in no-passing zones and for centerline markings on four-lane, undivided pavements. Commissioner Ziegler said he expects the pavement painting program will be practically finished by the end of June and about half of the bulk of the tourist travel season, so as to bring a minimum of inconvenience to motorists using state highways during heavy traffic summer months.

Attend Region IV Municipal Meeting

Local City Councilmen V. O. Bates and Paul S. Calkins, City Attorney Paul A. Pate, and City Manager James O. Tremain were among 24 municipal officials representing 24 cities and villages in this district at the regional meeting of the Michigan Municipal League's Region IV in Pontiac on May 5.

J. Dean Stanley, former consultant to the Municipal Finance Commission, spoke on municipal bonding during the first part of the afternoon. The second part of the session was devoted to a general discussion among the municipal officials present. Subjects ranged from annexation procedures to metropolitan authority problems, to highways, toll roads and freeways.

Officials at the one-day meeting selected the following people as their Regional officers for 1955: Regional chairman, Harold Lindsay, Mayor, Mr. Clement; vice-chairman, A. J. Weinberger, Mayor, South Lyon; regional secretary, Robert Stone, Village Manager, Rochester.

Guests and speakers included J. G. Schatz, special assignment engineer of the Michigan State Highway Department; A. C. Sheridan, planning engineer; Don Cruise, highway engineer; and D. Kelley, all of the highway department.

Region IV of the Michigan Municipal League consists of the counties of Genesee, Macomb and Oakland.

The Michigan Municipal League is an organization of cities and villages of the State with headquarters in Ann Arbor. It is devoted to the advancement of home rule and the improvement of municipal government in Michigan.

MAKE THOROUGH CHECK OF HOUSE BEFORE BUYING

If you're buying a house you'd best take time to check out the condition, structural condition, functional arrangement and orientation.

There are four main factors to consider, says William Morris, assistant professor of engineering drawing at Michigan State College.

Location is probably the most important item he pointed out. This includes nearness to schools, churches and playgrounds; condition of the surroundings; and probable changes and general stability of the neighborhood.

"All pertinent structural items should be checked. From the cause of plaster cracks, which may involve settlement, to the number of electrical outlets and their location," he said. "All utilities should be examined as to type, size and size to determine their adequacy." Morris suggests that a complete check list be made up and followed.

Functional factors include the matters of living working and storage space. "An analysis should be made of room sizes and possible furniture arrangement; closets as to type, size and number; the arrangement and equipment in the kitchen," the MSC professor said.

"How livable the house is," he emphasized, will be determined largely by how well the various sizes and layouts of rooms and equipment have been devised to provide the best functional arrangement.

Orientation includes the position of the house with reference to available sunlight, ventilation (multiple breezes), and view. Although it may be necessary to compromise the location of some rooms; all should be carefully considered, he said. "The living room, which is most important, should have a southern exposure. A bedroom, if used as a nursery, should also have a southern exposure. The kitchen should be in the northeast, north, or southeast."

In addition, Morris stated, valuable information should be made in the various county and city offices. This information should include the year the house was built, the assessed valuation, previous taxes and other matters of interest to the prospective buyer.


Make Up Time

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
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
