Examine Possibilities Of Student, City Official Exchange Next Fall

The Farmington High Student Council, in cooperation with the Kiwanis and Exchange Clubs, is examining the possibilities of a student-city official exchange, tentatively set for September 23.

The exchange is a new idea at Farmington. It would put elected students in the offices of city officials, such as mayor, city manager, assistant city manager, police chief, sergeant and Houtenpost, fire chief, etc.

The Council first learned of the exchange from Mr. George Wehling of the Kiwanis Club and Mr. Norbert Ratsky, Assistant City Manager of Farmington.

Mr. Ratsky explained that the election of students, who would run the city for a day, should be done as much like the city election as possible. This would entail setting up an election committee which would work with the city election committee to learn how to do it. No one on the committee could run for city office.

The purpose of such an exchange is to better acquaint the students of Farmington High with a city government, according to Mr. Ratsky.

Mr. Wehling also added that the Exchange Club might give the student officials a luncheon and that the Kiwanis Club would give them a dinner. After that, in the

evening, the Kiwanis Club would sponsor a dance open to all Farmington High students.

Probably Juniors of this year would be the city officials.

All these plans are not definite and nothing will be certain for a while. J. S.

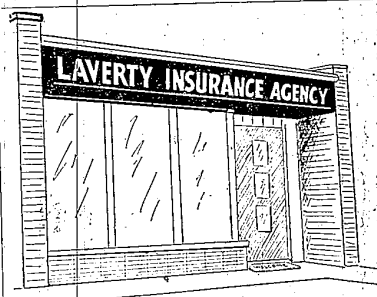
