### Young Baseball Hopefuls Practice In Earnest, Draft Set For Friday

The approximately 350 boys in the 8 to 12 year age bracket took part for baseball in the Farmington area this summer have been working out in earnest for the past week in bids for berths on Little League teams. Friday will be the big night as a player draft will be made. Competition is extremely keen and only 40 of the total number will be selected to bid for slots on the four teams. Of this 40, approximately 15 will be dropped to keep the teams within Little League requirements.

Boys not garnering spots on Little League teams will be retained on farm clubs in the Farmington Baseball for Boys Junior Division. They will be assigned to various teams and play regularly scheduled contests for more baseball seasoning. The Farmington summer baseball program has grown by leaps and bounds since it was organized a few years ago. This year the number of boys reporting out for practice on the various teams is almost double that of last year. It is the desire of the Farmington Baseball for Boys group to point all young boys in the area a chance to take part in this worthwhile recreational program, but they can only do it with the help of all parents. Help with time by managing, instructing, etc., is needed as well as financial help. All parents are asked to pitch in.

The notes will be dated May 16, 1955, will mature August 29, 1955 and will bear interest at a rate of 4 1/2 percent, both principal and interest will be payable at the Farmington, Michigan, office of the Treasurer of Farmington, Michigan. Denominations and form of notes to be at the option of the purchaser. An accrued interest to date of delivery of such notes must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery. For the purpose of awarding the notes the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on notes from January 1, 1955 to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. 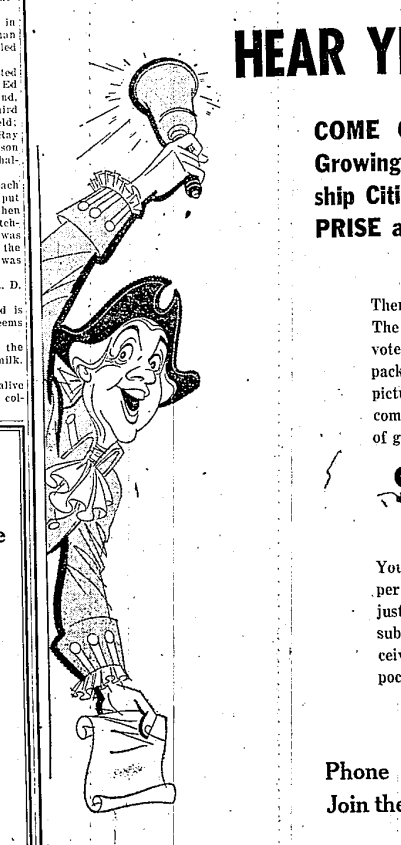
