FOR ANNUAL SCHOOL ELECTION JUNE 13, 1955

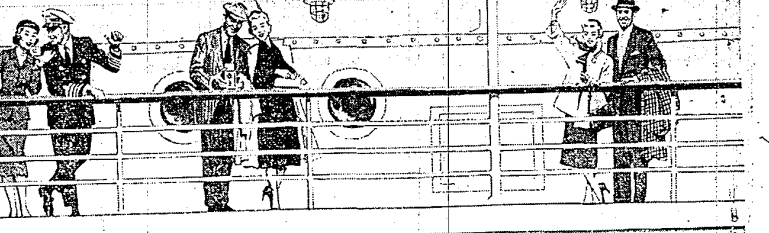
To the qualified electors of the Township School District of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan:

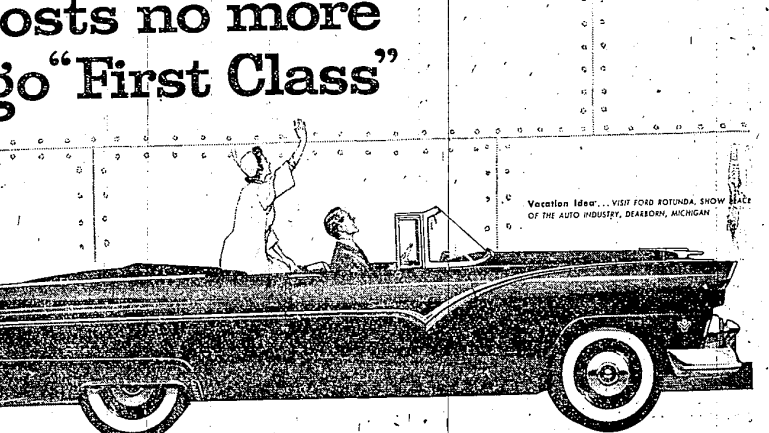
Electors are advised hereby that their names must appear on the registration books of the city or township in which they live in order to vote in school elections.
