Curtain. There are groups there who are willing to fight for their own freedom. We shouldn't send any American soldiers to free any country. We should assist in establishing in every one of these countries an underground and see that it is trained and equipped. "Our American foreign policy must change. I don't think we are going to do anything like Yalta again, where we were dishonest. I hope we will follow American policy. I hope we will follow a policy based on Christian principles. I hope we'll do those things that have been successful — confronting the bluff and the threat with positive action. Any American foreign policy, to be successful, will have to be honest. And it should follow strategies which will make it so difficult for Russia, inside the Iron Curtain, that a third fighting war will be impossible."
