CITY TO RECEIVE \$6,010 FROM HIGHWAY FUND. The City of Farmington will receive a total of \$6,010.34 as its share of the First Quarter receipts from the State Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

The money is now being distributed to the counties, cities and incorporated villages as provided for in Act 51 of the Public Acts of 1951. Under the formula of the State Highway and Weight taxes, the Diesel fuel tax and a small amount of miscellaneous fees are distributed 44% to the state, 37% to the counties, and 19% to the cities and incorporated villages. The distribution is made after deductions for non-highway use and collection costs.

Oakland County will receive a total of \$1,235,485.27 under the distribution. This money is to be used for expenditure on county roads. The total amount of money being distributed represents an increase of \$3,371,911.54 over the First Quarter of 1954.

LEGAL NOTICE

WATER USE ORDINANCE (Continued from Page 6A) Water Emergency declaration and regulations of the Mayor and Council of the City of Farmington, Michigan, are hereby proclaimed with the following: Four new cars were donated by Berling McHugh, Farmington Ford dealers, for the contest.

Section 10. Upon proclaiming such emergency the Mayor of the City of Farmington shall cause a newspaper published in and/or circulating in the City, the Police Department, the Superintendent of Public Works and the City Clerk thereof, and shall also authorize and order printed or typed notices setting forth in concise and brief form the emergency proclamation, and the regulations pertaining to water consumption; the existence of this ordinance and the penalties provided for violation hereof, and shall cause such notices to be distributed generally in all sections of the City and in all premises outside the City limits using City water, which notices shall be posted in 8 public places in the City.

Section 11. No person, firm or corporation shall use any City water during a period of emergency in connection with the building of any structure or road in the leveling of land, landscaping, in the building of any road or street or for any purpose or underfooting connected with a then serviced occupied residence, business, factory, shop or mercantile establishment, without having first obtained a permit therefor from the City Manager.

Section 12. The permit provided for in Section 11 above, shall only be granted when and upon such terms, conditions and restrictions as the City Manager shall deem necessary to safeguard an adequate water supply for the then City water users.

Section 13. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the Fire Department or to the performance of any necessary municipal operation, function or undertaking.

Section 14. It shall be the duty of the Police Department to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance, but any official or employee of the City or any resident of the City shall be authorized by the City Manager to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 15. During such emergency it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to use water supplied by the City of Farmington in violation of the restrictions placed thereon as aforesaid.

Section 16. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to violate any provision of this Ordinance or the terms of any Proclamation of Emergency issued hereunder, and each and every occasion of any such violation shall constitute and become a separate and distinct offense and punishable as such.

Section 17. If any person, firm or corporation shall violate any provision of this Ordinance, or the terms and restrictions placed on the use of water in violation of the Ordinance of the Mayor made under authority of this Ordinance after (1) having been orally informed of the terms of such Proclamation, or (2) having been given, received or seen a copy of such Proclamation, he shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$100.00, plus costs of court, or be imprisoned for a period of not to exceed 30 days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 18. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, and shall be published May 19 and shall become effective immediately. This Ordinance was introduced, adopted and enacted by the Council of the City of Farmington at a regular meeting held in the Municipal Building in the City of Farmington on May 16, 1955, by a affirmative vote of 5 members of the Council present at such meeting.
