Farmington's three representatives took a second, a fifth, and one came in the top ten in his event at the State Track Meet at Annapolis last Saturday.

Coach Humble stated that he was very pleased with the way the boys performed.

Thomas Mahaney, in the pole vault, scored a new P. H. S. record of 11' 4". This was good for fifth place in the meet.

Dick Grimschaw also set a new record in the quarter mile as he finished the old record of 52.1 seconds at the regional meet by 9-10 in a second. Grimschaw placed second in the meet and pushed Master's of Adrian to a new state record of 30.6.

Don Nichols also placed in the top ten high jumpers as he went out at 5' 10".

Trojans Lose Heartbreaker To Clarkston, 7-6

The Clarkston Wolves handed Clarenceville's ambitious Trojans a heartbreaker: 7-6 defeat at Clarkston last Thursday to dump the Trojans out of first place.

The Trojans, who are seeking their fourth consecutive W. O. C. L. baseball title, appeared to have the game scored up at 5-3 with two out in the sixth inning. However, the title-hungry wolves refused to tie the score at 5-5 to send the contest into overtime.

The Trojans once more looked like winners in the ninth when Captain Bob Snell drove home what looked like the winning run. The "never-say-die" Clarkston boys, however, tied the score at 6-6.

A long double by Clarkston catcher Roger Johnson won the game with two out in the last of the 11th. Sam Lathroque suffered his first defeat of the season, pitching the last 7 innings after starter Glen Reed injured a finger in the fourth.

Clarkston now leads by 4½ games over Clarenceville with three games yet to be played.

FALCON TRACK TEAM DROPS DUAL MEET AT WATERFORD, 72-37

The Farmington High track team competed in a dual meet with Waterford. The score was Waterford 72, Farmington 37.

Farmington did manage, however, to take six firsts, two seconds and five thirds.

Farmington's Dick Grimschaw took two firsts as he ran the 100 yard dash in 10.6 and the 220 in 24.3.

Both Don Nichols and Dennis Mahaney took their usual first places in the high jump and pole vault as Nichols jumped 5 feet 2 inches and Mahaney pole vaulted 10 feet 10 inches. Nicho also placed third in the low hurdles.

George Oldfield and Farmington's 880 relay team rounded out the squad's first places when Oldfield ran the 880 in 2:12.5 and the relay team ran their race in 1:39.8.

Farmington's medley team and Tom Kosty, in the 220, took seconds.

Farmington team members, Bob Byrne, pole vaulter; Tom Sundra, shot put; Don Shuster, miler; and Doug Byron, in the 440, all took thirds.

The final track meet is the League meet at Ferrisdale today.

ONE-SPOT ANGLING, NOISINESS RESULT IN POOR CATCHES

Don't be a one-spot or a one-bait fisherman, advises Earl F. Lajler, chairman of the University of Michigan's Department of Fisheries.

And try to look at fishing through the eyes of a fish, he adds.

"You'd never find a hunter sitting in one spot all day," says Professor Lajler, "and yet look at how many fishermen just sit and wait for the fish to come to them."

He suggests that anyone who really wants to catch something so after it. First, start casting the shoreline with a floating-diving lure.

"As the water is clear start the bait moving. The second it hits the water, he urges, but if the water is cloudy let it stay still for five or ten seconds, then start retrieving, he adds.

"This gives the fish time to find what caused the splash if visibility isn't good," he explains.

If you don't look any near the shore cast into deeper water using a sinking bait which will plumb the depths, advises Professor Lajler.

And if they're still eluding you, try the heacter cover like lily pad fields, weed patches or the moss beds and cast a slow sinking lure to this cover, making a steady retrieve. "Excellent places to work are around sunken logs, fallen trees, brush piles and rocky shorelines," he maintains.

And by all means, he declares, approach quietly.

"The big ones didn't get bit through being thoughtless or stupid and they'll give you a wide berth. Be quiet, unobtrusive, and as much like a fish as possible. If you really want loaded lines."

SHIFTS TO MIDGET LEAGUE BASEBALL IN LIVONIA

Upon the recommendation of the Parks and Recreation Commission, a change from Little League Baseball to Midget League Baseball, announced by the Michigan Recreation Association, was made in Livonia recently.

The Midget League eliminates any boundary lines or zoning districts. It also gives more opportunity to play Midget Ball and coaches and managers the chance to teach more of the fundamentals of baseball under the Michigan Recreation Association rules.

The entry deadline for entering the Midget League is May 31, with the opening game scheduled for June 6. Games will be played on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

MORE TROUT, INC. ASKS CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT AID

More Trout, Inc., a non-profit organization dedicated to the betterment of trout fishing, has asked the Michigan Conservation Commission for financial help to carry on and improve the corporation's work.

More Trout's president, Amos Rheume, a retired Detroit businessman, appeared before the Commission at a recent meeting and asked for \$13,200 per year to enable the organization to continue its work for another three years.

The organization has a fish-lift man on foot out, leaving a vast area of water. Lamprey control and fish-feeding experiments are carried on.

Rheume summarized work done during More Trout's four-year life and pointed to financial drawbacks the organization now faces.

The Commission asked for a detailed budget of proposed work and promised further consideration when that is submitted.

DUCK BAITING IN MICHIGAN VERY STRONGLY OPPOSED

Coaxing ducks into places where they can be shot may be all right in some places, but not in Michigan.

Meeting in Lansing last week, the state Conservation Commission took a solid stand against baiting. The seven members agreed as being "very strongly opposed" to baiting in Michigan or to the practice as a policy in the flyway.

Baiting is done by chucking grain or other duck foods into marsh areas or open waters near blinds. When the birds come to feed, hunting becomes simple.

Commission's statement came in the eve of the annual Mississippi Flyways Council meeting in St. Louis, Missouri, when a number of flyway hunting regulations were discussed, including the controversial problem of baiting. Two representatives from the Conservation Department attended the meeting.

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
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
