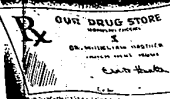

State Youths To Get Fluoride Treatment

About 30,000 Michigan youngsters from 3 to 13 years of age will have fluoride treatments for their teeth this summer in the program to help prevent tooth decay, the Michigan Department of Health reported recently.

Fluoride treatments, which prevent about 40 per cent of new dental decay, will be given in 42 counties. The solution is painted on teeth in a series of four sittings.

Supervised by dentists and sponsored by local health departments, school and civic groups, the dental work will be done by 55 students from the University of Michigan and University of Detroit.

A nominal fee is charged to make the program self-supporting. Clinics will be set up at Oakland and several other counties in a total of 170 different locations.

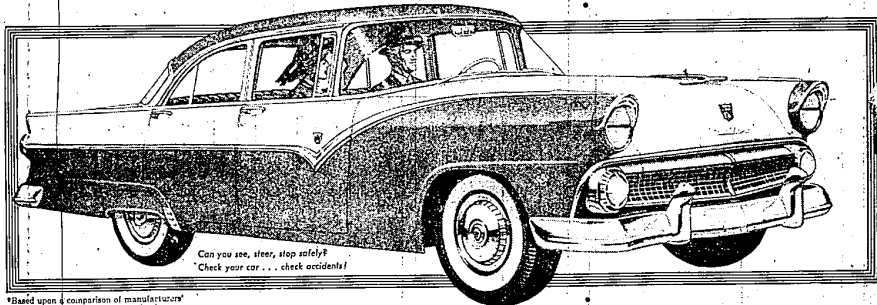
Electors are advised hereby that their names must appear on the registration books of the city or township in which they live in order to vote in school elections.

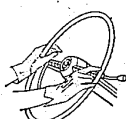

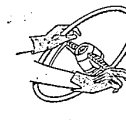

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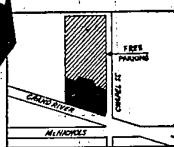
