

MICHIGAN BOASTS MANY FIRSTS IN PUBLIC HEALTH

Michigan people have scored important "firsts" in public health. Dr. Albert E. Heuser, State Health Commission, has named Michigan as the first state to have blood plasma in all its groups "from grandparents to new born." He says few if any states can match the public health progress made by Michigan people.

Records show Michigan's health department was the first state agency in the nation to distribute blood plasma to hospitals and physicians for civilian use.

Michigan is also listed as the leading state in providing community nurseries for the application of sodium fluoride solution to the teeth of youngsters.

The state health department had the first mobile chest x-ray unit in the country, secured in October, 1940.

(Continued from Page 2) but the honesty to acknowledge them, the intelligence to understand them, our hearts to pulsate with the terror of them!"

"You say that the 500,000,000 are not Communists? Of course they're not! And the Communists don't intend that the two and a half billion shall be Communists either. They conquered the 500,000,000 and they propose to conquer the two and a half billion. These 500,000,000 are in the laboratory of Communist conditioning, being educated, indoctrinated, brain washed, selectively liquidated, faminated, technically and militarily trained to conquer the entire world with the ease and quest destruction of vast segments of the human race."

"That's the simple and honest truth. No effort of the imagination can make it untrue. No heroic act of the will can blot it out. Unpleasant though it may be, like a terrible body malignancy, there it stands, demanding the most earnest consideration and urgent action. I suggest that an honest, enlightened, intelligent analysis of the figure can lead to one conclusion and one only. The Communists are conquering the world. Not that they will conquer it, not that they might conquer it. They are conquering it."

Repair Blistered Area Before Painting Home

Blisters on the outside of a house usually come from two causes - moisture or resin. Of the two, moisture in the house is the biggest single cause. When repainting a house with a blister problem, you should first try to solve the problem before putting on a new coat of paint. All paint in the blister areas must be removed right down to the bare wood. If resin is causing the trouble, much of it can be boiled out with a blow torch. If moisture is the villain - and you can tell by sticking your thumb nail into a blister because the water will roll out - then, install vents or louvers. These will let the moisture escape without ruining your paint job.
