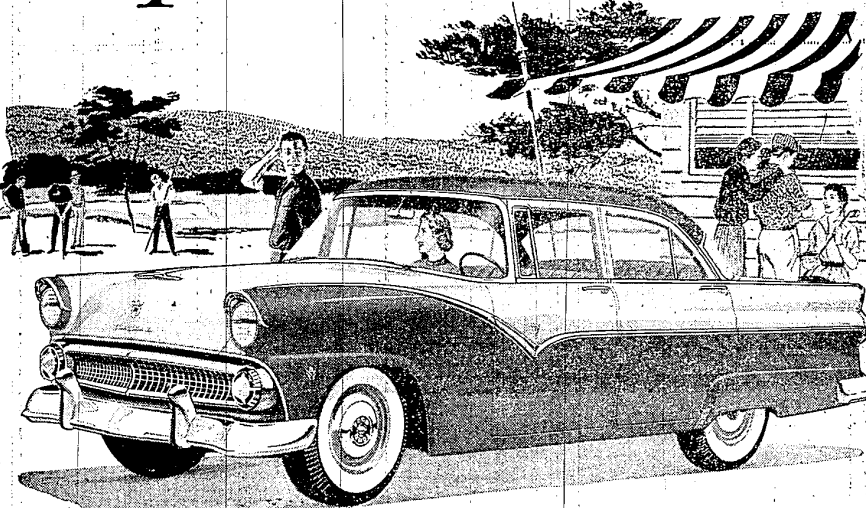
From where I sit, this country
