Insecticides Should Be Applied Early To Protect Garden Plants

While the post-war insecticide D.D.T. still kills many garden insects that any one-year preparation, new formulations are now available which experts say do better on some pests than D.D.T.

Aphids, or plant lice, which sprout from the underside of leaves, are a pest of garden plants. It kills some, but misses most of them. Lindane, one of the new ones, kills aphids plus all beetles, worms, leaf beetles, and flies besides which D.D.T. destroys.

Lindane is a chemical refinement of a German material imported when the war ended, which was handicapped by a bad odor. This has been removed. Like D.D.T., lindane kills insects which it hits, and leaves a residue on the plant which is fatal to pests that eat or walk on it. Therefore, it is a vapor which is fatal to insects that breathe it.

Chlordane, which is also a triple threat to plant pests, is now recommended for spraying. Insects that are in the soil or crawl

TREND RETURNS TO PATTERNED FLOOR COVERINGS

A move toward more patterns in floor coverings is a trend this year, according to fashion analysts.

This is not an unexpected trend in view of some of the factors which influence the design of soft surface floor coverings today. One of these reasons is that plain or monochromatic carpeting has been widely accepted for a long period of time. Therefore, people are beginning to look for something new. Secondly, the inundation of tufted synthetics, most of which have been plain textures, has provided another incentive for the manufacturer to develop something fresh and different.

Thirdly, the design of precise patterns and motifs for popular use has encouraged the designer to encourage their adaptation in soft surface floor coverings. Above all, patterned carpets have special appeal in rooms which are the focus of traffic and general use such as dens or television rooms.

These patterned carpets take many forms. Spicy florals and paisley designs, downy floral and leaves in contemporary terms, motifs, soft easy-to-use modern patterns and patterned area rugs are examples of this trend.

The selection of synthetic floor coverings continues to widen with a number of new developments. The first two-toned, all nylon has been introduced. The first room-sized synthetic rug program; profile textures are more prominent; as are cotton overtufted designs.

Patterned area rugs, too, are being styled with an eye for today. Two dramatic examples of this trend are seen in an elegant new washable downy floral and Oriental loom, an oval rug in monochromatic colors.

RAINBOW TROUT CAN SURVIVE IN BATTLE WITH SEA LAMPREYS

Sea lampreys are undoubtedly the most voracious of all the killing animals that a large question mark looms over what this means to sport fishing.

Some reports indicate that rainbow fishing has declined in some states, but these reports fail to justify any gloomy over-all picture of the future.

Just knowing the lamprey is a war against the sea lamprey of this worry and many wonder aloud if the lamprey hasn't turned the full fury of its appetite on the rainbow - now that he has cleaned out the lake trout.

But tests by the Conservation Department's Institute for Fisheries Research show that lampreys prefer, after lake trout, such food as suckers and burbot. Rainbows are farther down the list.

There is some question, too, about how many lampreys are in their present high population. For 10 years they have had easy pickings in the Great Lakes. But now the census is being taken, and some speculate lampreys will drop off to fit a less choice diet.

Meantime, what about the rainbow? Taken as a total, the lake trout and the rainbow are the two most important fish in the Great Lakes and Homestead dam, on the Detroit River, has been pushed to a rather close view of the problem. Apparently, only time will decide the future of Michigan's vaunted rainbow angling.

GIVES REASONS FOR LOSS OF DEER CONTROL IN STATE

Commenting on the Conservation Commission's loss of control of the deer herd, Director Gerald E. Eddy said: "Despite all-out efforts of our department, sportsmen's clubs, farm groups, outdoor writers and many others, the basic story of deer management did not get across to the people."

"There is little doubt in my mind that had the fundamental principle of deer control been widely understood, the legislature would have again granted discretionary authority to the Commission."

"Someone we failed to convince enough people of the fact that in deer management today we can keep our cake and eat it, too," continued the director. "This was not true 15 or 20 years ago when deer range was at its peak. Then, new growth which followed heavy logging and which was protected against widespread fires was just in easy reach of the animals, and in easy reach of a once-in-a-civilization circumstance. It never occurred before; chances are it will never occur again. That is an excellent range of years ago is now a tall forest; out of reach of hungry deer."

"Our deer range today is not limited, however; far from it. It can support a herd of about 600,000 animals. This herd has a natural resistance which permits hunters to harvest 20 per cent of the total each year. Under the antler law, they take 10 per cent. The herd must be in balance with its range and so starvation maintains that balance."

An Ordinance to Provide the Method of Drawing Juries in the Municipal Court in the City of Farmington.

Amending Amendment to Section 7, Ordinance No. C-30-53, Providing for Compensation of Municipal Judge, Associate Municipal Judge, Appointment and Compensation of Court Clerk and Duties of Judge and Clerk.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDINANCES:

That Section 7 of Ordinance No. C-30-53 as amended be and the same is hereby further amended to read:

7. The Municipal Judge, by and with the advice and consent of the City Manager shall appoint a Court Clerk, who shall perform such duties in connection with the operation of said Court as requested by the Municipal Judge or Associate Municipal Judge and is required by the Charter of said City. The salary of the Clerk shall be fixed by the City Manager, but in no case shall exceed the sum of \$3,000.00 per annum.

This amendment shall become effective July 1, 1955.
