Feminine Views Of South America Given By Woodcreek Doctor's Wife
 Last week The Enterprise ran a feature story on the extensive tour of South America taken by Dr. Conrad Lam and his wife, Marion Dr. Lam, 2910 Westmore. It was an account of her return from South America where Dr. Lam attended the meeting of the Argentine Pediatric Association.

This week we present feminine impressions of South America as told to Betty Newmark of Woodcreek by Mrs. Lam. The deepest and most outstanding impression that Marion Lam brought back from her recent trip to South America was the generous warmth and hospitality lavished on all visitors who tour this continent. The sincere desire to make them happy and comfortable was almost overwhelming. Nothing was too good for a guest. No one spared themselves any time or energy where the well being of the guests was concerned. This affectionate welcome was felt consistently in every country of the South American continent.

Spanish is the native tongue but Portuguese is spoken in some places. Mrs. Lam disclosed the ease with which she conversed with the people in their own language and his ability to read menus proved to be a great asset. However, many South Americans were unable to demonstrate their skill with the English language, so the language barrier was no problem at all. English is taught in all schools in the very early grades, so the greatest percentage of the people have some knowledge of our language.

The taste and quality of the food was just about average but abundant and rich. Six course meals are considered very ordinary in South America. Marion revealed that she missed the fresh salads which were never served unless a special request was made. All vegetables were cooked too long by our standards, she added. The differences in flavor were noticeable by the elaborate manner in which the foods were served. Butlers, wearing white gloves, were the accepted order at every meal. While the method of serving was elaborate and formal, the attire was informal at all times.

The pre-conceived conception that South American women all dress in bright, gay colors proved to be entirely wrong. On the contrary, most women's clothing was of neutral nondescript colors, almost on the drab side. Good synthetic fabrics are generally available. Nylon hose are of very inferior quality and not at all popular with the ladies, Mrs. Lam said.

Another pre-conceived notion that she would be entering a continent of darker skinned people also proved wrong for the doctor's wife. The Spaniard type, which is the very fair, clear skin contrasted with glossy raven black hair, may have predominated slightly, but the average run of the population was no different than one would see here in North America. After a little thought this became very easy to understand. Because Europe is closer to South America than it is to North America, many Europeans have lived there for three and four generations.

Marion still gets dreamy eyed when she reflects on the fabulous luxury of trans-continental air travel. "Orchids, cocktails, soft music and Chanel No. 5," sighed Marion. Then she hitched up her feet and busy gardening sticks to tackle the month's growth of weeds in her garden. She decided that all in all it was good to be back home.
