**STUDY PROPOSAL FOR SIGNAL LIGHT ON U. S. 16 IN CITY**

The State Highway Department has notified the City that it would approve the installation of a regulation traffic light at the intersection of Orchard Lake Road and Grand River.

The approval, however, would be subject to certain costs and improvements which would have to be borne by the City. The costs would include 2 1/2 percent of the expense of erection as well as maintenance of the traffic light. The improvements would cover widening of Orchard Lake Road immediately north of the intersection to provide two approach lanes, and also to restrict parking on Grand River for a block both east and west of Orchard Lake Road.

The Council authorized the City Manager to investigate the estimated cost of the improvements.

**FORD ROTUNDA FEATURES DISPLAYS OF OUTDOOR LIFE**

The Ford Rotunda is featuring displays on recreational facilities in Michigan this summer. Its main display is a realistic model of a portion of the state, including a running stream. The life-size display occupies almost 6,000 square feet in the Rotunda's center court. It is an exact replica of the tent camps typical of those found at more than 5,000 camp sites located throughout Michigan.

Other Michigan outdoor activities, including bathing, picnicking and golfing, are represented in life-like exhibits. Additional displays will show visitors the food specialties of various cities and sections of the state, as well as such Michigan vacation accessories as wearing apparel, boating and photo equipment and fishing gear.

Along with Michigan's scenic and recreational attractions, the Rotunda is also featuring a complete calendar of special events being staged throughout the state from June through August. Particular attention is being called to Michigan's many centennial celebrations highlighted by the 100th birthday celebrations of the "Soak" Locks at South Side Marine and of Michigan State College, the nation's first agricultural college.

Throughout the summer the Rotunda will be open from 9:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m., Monday through Friday; and from 1:00 to 9:00 p.m. on Saturday.

vision appeared before the Council to request another public hearing in regard to the proposed rezoning from residential to commercial of land on the west side of Farmington Road between an extension of Sloucm Drive and the Cut-Off.

The Council members stated that they could not commit themselves to another hearing at this time but promised to consider the request. They also advised the property owners that they would be notified when the zoning map and ordinance were to come up for action.

A series of recommendations were read to the Council from Dr. Joseph Gadow, Health Officer, regarding the correction of sanitary conditions in the vicinity of Grand River east of Orchard Lake Road. The Council directed the clerk to write the owners of the property involved requesting that they comply with the recommendations.

The Council accepted the offer of the State Highway Department to purchase approximately 3 acres of city-owned land south of the Cut-Off at a total price of \$16,250. The property is to be used by the Highway Department for the improvement of the Cut-Off as part of the Farmington - Brighton expressway. Action was also taken to rezone the remainder of the city-owned property from suburban to general industrial with the provision that the restrictions proposed in the revised zoning ordinance be followed.
