Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Jones are entertaining the latter's sister from Georgia at their Tuck Road home.

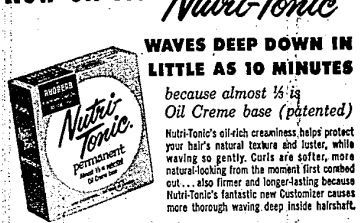
Local Man Wins Freedom Award

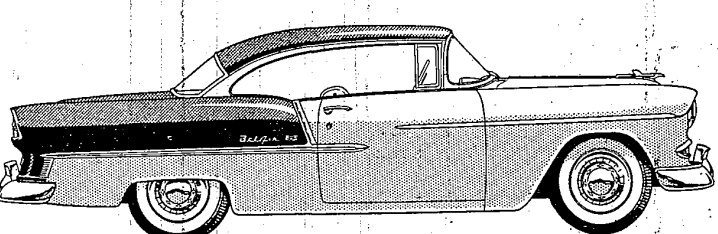
