

Franklin Church Group To Report On Building Plans

The congregation of the Franklin Community Church will hear a church building committee report Monday, July 11, at 8:00 p.m., according to Norman E. Kreider, public relations director. Included in the report will be a comprehensive statement of building fund finances, a detailed presentation of the bids received for the various phases of construction and the possible starting and completion dates.

Building Committee Chairman Grant I. Siver will preside. The report will be in the form of a recommendation by the committee to the congregation. A period of discussion will follow the report.

Indications are that if the recommendations are accepted, actual construction of the new church will start less than a year following the appointment of the committee and less than eight months after the congregation approved the motion of the church to the Franklin Village Green on a site donated by Mr. and Mrs. George Wellington Smith. A symbolic ground-breaking service at the site was held at sunrise on Easter Day.

Stimulus for the erection of a completely new structure came from vastly increased participation in the Church School and in attendance at the worship hours. It had been the original hope that land could be secured for the expansion of the historical Little church on German Mill Road but when that proved impossible Mr. Smith offered the new site which is just two blocks west of the present location.

A beautiful colonial style church is planned which, when completed, will include a sanctuary seating 300, a social hall seating 200 at tables, a church office and pastor's study as well as class rooms, youth, choir, and committee rooms. Committee members in addition to Kreider and Siver are E. J. Green, V. J. Fisher, H. F. Barr, D. J. Crawford, O. C. Garwood, T. H. Brehm and the pastor, Robert J. Sears.

Plan Organization Of Air Force Reserve Unit Here

A new Air Force Reserve unit for former Air Force officers and enlisted men in the Farmington, Northville, Livonia, Plymouth and Novi areas is now being organized.
