### Indians Move Into First Place Tie With Dodgers In Babe Ruth League

The Arrowsmith Tool Indians vaulted into a tie for first place in the Babe Ruth League last week by downing the previous champions, the Red Sox, 5-4.

played on Monday evening, the Indians-Dodgers contest was a thriller from start to finish. A line single by Neil Stevenson in the fourth inning with two on base, Larry Andrews and Bob Utley, who both tallied, gave the Indians their two big runs. The Dodgers lone run came in the sixth when Larry Lynch poured out an extra base knock and came home on a single by Amos Deaven.

In the seventh inning John Clark led off for the Dodgers with a towering triple to center field, the tying run but was caught napping by Larry Andrews who worked the hidden ball trick successfully to tag him out.

Bob Utley, giving up seven runs, was the winning pitcher. Cliff Simmons, though allowing only five hits, suffered the loss. Fred Hassel tied the Indians at the plate with two hits in three innings while Al LeSage was the leading stickman for the Dodgers with two for four.

On Tuesday the Farmington Enterprise Giants slipped past the Arrow Tool Red Sox, 5-4, bringing over the winning run in the final inning on a pass ball. The Giants scored their other four runs in the big fifth inning by combining three hits, one being a homer by Ron Thomas, and a hit batsman. This eliminated a four run lead which the Red Sox had built up in the earlier innings of play.

The winning run for the Giants in the seventh was scored when Vincent Berkley singled and advanced to third on a hit and a fielder's choice. He came over the plate when a pitch got past Red Sox catcher Ross Byron.

Jim Chalmers went all the way on the mound for the Giants and yielded six hits. Carl Love, who totted for the Red Sox, gave up only five safeties while absorbing the loss.

An 8-3 victory for the Indians over the Giants on Wednesday gave them undisputed possession of first place with a record of four wins against two losses.

The Tribe collected nine hits in the contest off Giant hurler Cliff Coleman while Larry Andrews held the Giants to six hits and took credit for the win. The Indians scored all eight of their runs in the first two innings of play, mashing over two in the first frame and the remaining six in a big second inning spree. Mike Benner and Fred Buesser with two

hits apiece, led the attack at the plate for the Indians.

All three Giant runs were scored by downing the previous champions, the Red Sox, 5-4.

The first inning the Indians on Thursday evening by dropping the Red Sox 11-7 in a hitting free-for-all. A total of 17 hits were collected with the Dodgers getting 11. Cliff Simmons and Amos Deaven each got three for the Dodgers while Al LeSage got two. Carl Love connected with two for the Sox with one being a home run.

In the first inning the Dodgers picked up three runs but the Giants came, right back in their half of the game, inating to score two. The Dodgers kept right on going at bat and put over one run in the first innings, two in the fourth, three in the fifth and two in the seventh. The Giants were held, however, until the fifth when they brought over their last two tallies.

Larry Lynch went the route for the winning-Dodgers as did Ross Byron for the losing Red Sox.

### Cards Dominate Little League

### GOVERNOR'S CUP TROT SET FOR FRIDAY, JULY 8

The annual \$10,000 Governor's Cup Trot will be held Friday night July 8, at Northville Downs.

It is one of the two major Northville events of the season. The other is the \$10,000 Michigan Pacing Derby to be held Friday, July 22.

The Governor's Cup Trot has attracted a field that includes many of the best in the east and midwest. Racing Secretary Harry Hatch believes that about ten will face the starter.

The list of nominations includes Lord Stewart, Rhythmic Song, Betty Astra, Scotch Valley, Namey Song, Darn Safe, Lord Pick and Pronto Don.

Lord Stewart is the third leading money winning trotter of all time. He came in second for the 1955 \$10,000 President's Cup Trot at the Baltimore Raceway. Rhythmic Song set the record time for the \$10,000 Detroit Trotting Derby at Hazel Park.

The first racing for the Governor's Cup at Northville was in 1945. The record is held by the Great Proximity who trotted the mile in 2:02 1/5 in 1948. Post time Friday night is 8:30 p.m., sharp.
