SCHOOL COOKS,  
MANAGERS ATTEND  
M. S. U. WORKSHOP

Six Farmington women were among the 200 persons from Michigan who attended the ninth annual workshop for school cooks and managers at Michigan State University last week. The meeting was sponsored by the M.S.U. Department of Institution Administration and coordinated by the Continuing Education Service.

Attending from Farmington were: Alice Cox, 31229 Farmington Road, from Farmington Township School; Margaret D. Hart, 29740 Linden Avenue, from Ten Mile School; Mrs. Shirley W. Mary Lee Hart, head of Michigan State's Home Economics Education, suggested to the cooks and managers that through teamwork, schools become training laboratories where youngsters learn principles of nutrition, good table manners and obtain a better understanding of lunch programs. She explained that the teacher should begin by conferring with school lunch personnel to determine what part each will play in building a teamwork program.

The three-day workshop also covered record keeping, sanitation, quantity food production, food preparation, purchasing, service and selling the school lunch program.

CAMP JULY 11-18

Three 4-H Club members, Don Wimmer of Farmington, Beverly Sanders of Royal Oak, and James Thompson of Milford will represent Oakland County at Michigan's 1955 Conservation Camp for 4-H members on July 11-18, says Mary Nixon, home demonstration agent.

This year the camp is being held at Camp Shaw in the Michigan State University Experiment Station Farm in Chatham. About 500 Michigan 4-H members, all outstanding in conservation projects, will attend. They will go on many field trips including visits to a mine, a paper mill, and state and national forests.

The young folks will also see examples of wild life management in the Seney Federal Migratory Water Fowl Refuge and study deer herds at Cusino Game Refuge. Some spots such as the Pictured Rocks in Munising, Big Springs near Manistique, and the new Straits bridge at St. Ignace will be included in the trips.




