OBSERVER POSTS CELEBRATING 3rd ANNIVERSARY

Thursday, July 14, members of the Farmington Ground Observer Post join with other posts across the nation in celebration of the third anniversary of "Operation Skywatch." Every day, around the clock, thousands of volunteers at observation posts in 27 states have maintained a close watch of the sky for aircraft which might conceivably be hostile. In Michigan today there are more than 3,000 Civil Defense volunteers manning 529 observation posts, of which 91 are in operation 24 hours a day. On the third anniversary of this program, approximately 15,000 Ground Observer Posts now in operation in the United States will be increased to 25,000 and the number of filter centers raised from 49 to 72. Among the new volunteers will be one in Saginaw, who will replace the filter center now in operation in Grand Rapids.
