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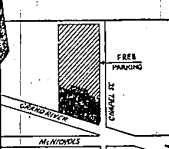
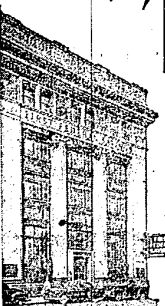
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Along the Creek in Woodcreek

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Conservation Violators Receive Jail Sentences

Justices and municipal judges in Michigan passed out a total of 292 days in jail sentences to seven conservation law violators in recent court actions.

The Conservation Department's latest weekly summary of violators shows that three men were sentenced for "shining" deer, three for carrying loaded firearms in vehicles and one for possession

of game birds and animals out of season. The list contained names of 87 violators; 18 broke game laws, one left rubbish on state-owned land, the remainder violated fish laws.

As of January of this year, 251,000 South Vietnam refugees received Red Cross parcels of food, clothing, and other necessities.

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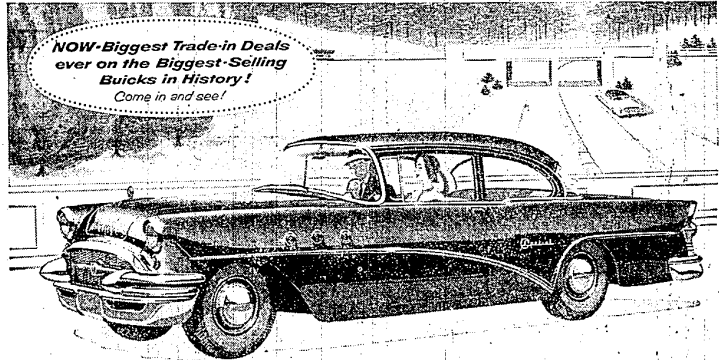
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
