The Arrowsmith Indians swept three games last week to take undisputed possession of first place in the Babe Ruth League. Tuesday's game between the Cards and Tigers, which the Cards took 2-1, was a tight contest, with stellar pitching highlighting the close play. Harvey Chapman, of the Cards, and Gary MacLean, of the Tigers, battled it out on the mound. Chapman, in going the route, gave up only two hits and struck out 14. MacLean was asked for three safeties and struck out 12.

The Cards collected both their runs in the third inning by combining a walk, an error, a single

Michigan Fishing Shows Growing Popularity

The growing popularity of fishing in Michigan was evident this week in the Conservation Department's report of fish license sales.

A. L. McNeil, in charge of licensing, said that sales of both resident fishing licenses and trout stamps appear headed for new records.

To date, dealers have reported selling 115,000 trout stamps and 472,000 fishing licenses. To this date last year, 90,000 trout stamps and 422,000 fishing licenses were reported sold.

Both totals for this date are the highest on record.

In 1951, anglers purchased 216,000 trout stamps and 879,000 fishing licenses.

Planners Available To Help Develop Farmland

Farm planners are available to help landowners in southern Michigan plan wildlife-habitat development on their lands.

Trees and shrubs are provided free to farmers and others who have five or more acres below the Bay City - Muskegon line in southern Michigan.

Landowners can get started in the program by dropping a postcard to the Conservation Department's game division in Lansing.

Waterfowl Nesting Reported Successful

Waterfowl nesting in Canadian wetland areas appear to be moving along favorably.

U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service biologists report that "early migrations of ducks and geese combined with good surface water and delayed farm plowing set the scene for successful nesting by most species."
