steps for drawing up the contract with the Wallace Construction Company, low bidder. Work will be started on the annex in the near future, it was indicated. Wallace Construction was also awarded a contract for construction of roads and parking facilities at the same site.

A discussion was conducted on the construction of a proposed well house at the Gill Road School site. It was decided that tests be made to determine the amount of water available in the area before money is expended for the building.

Estimates were submitted to the Board on the cost of constructing a complete athletic field as proposed at the high school site. After a brief review of the report, it was decided that a more detailed study is required. Estimates were placed on file to be considered at a later meeting.

Other matters taken up by the Board included the hiring of Archie Leonard as school attorney for another year, the appointment of a special education teacher, and the acceptance of a resignation from an elementary teacher who taught in the system last year.

A brief discussion was held on the purchase of additional sites for future school buildings. Trustee Farley Thomson suggested that before any new sites were purchased it should be determined the amount of land needed at each site.

The Board then met in executive session for further discussion of the sites. Recommendations were made by the special School Board committee which had previously been appointed to select possible locations.

The board authorized the purchase of furniture for the Boisdale and Edgewood Elementary Schools in the amount of approximately \$10,000 as recommended by Stanley Irish, Assistant Superintendent. A motion was also made and approved to request an advance in State Aid in the amount of \$50,000 to cover operating costs until local tax moneys are received.

SET TRIAL DATE ON NEGLIGENT HOMICIDE CHARGE

Examination of a complaint against Jack O. Eccles, 23038 Violet Street, on charges of negligent homicide was heard in Municipal Court before Judge John Schulte on Friday morning and the case was bound over to Circuit Court in Pontiac for trial on Monday, July 18.

The complaint was filed against Eccles on June 2 following the death of Art Sheldon of 22660 Middlebelt Road. Sheldon was knocked from his motorcycle and fatally injured in an accident at Orchard Lake and Shipwassee on Sunday, May 22. According to police reports, Eccles cut in front of Sheldon in making a left turn onto Shipwassee from Orchard Lake Road. Eccles left the scene of the accident but returned voluntarily about a half hour later, police stated.

Just a week before the big three-day holiday (July 4), I and ten other neighbors shared the cost of \$175 for road oil on Nine Mile Road starting at the first house west of Farmington Road and thence west to Gill Road. Oil was on only six weeks - yes, we know it didn't last long, but with only a 25 m.p.h. speed limit it should have lasted all summer. This stretch is not posted and traffic is terrific, to say the least. We are still wondering how much traffic must pass to warrant black-top or paving?

We are bogged down with dirt even to the dishes in our cupboards. This condition we endure winter and summer. Trees and shrubbery, our children's hair, clothing, etc.: it's positively distracting.

Our own services and business are enough to pound oil roads to pieces. Mr. Tennant and Mr. Blanchard could alleviate such a burden on us home owners by sharing a few budget dollars for black-top. Then we could eliminate the rats by intermittent grading and chloride applications. Please, Mr. Tennant and Mr. Blanchard, don't you think we have taken enough?

We have never complained, have we? We have just taken the brunt and endured the worst dust and impossible winter roads imaginable. I know I have seen finer pig yards than some of our county roads this past winter.
