FOOD REQUIRES SPECIAL CARE DURING SUMMER

Warm weather makes it necessary to take special care so that foods you prepare or serve are safe to eat, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, Detroit, commissioner of health, advises. Since January 1, there were 21 cases of suspicious food poisoning reported to and investigated by the Detroit Department of Health. Most of these were traced to food served to groups at picnics, weddings, or meetings where food was prepared in large quantities by persons who do not act as food handlers ordinarily.

Dr. Molner suggests that a good rule to follow is to keep food hot, keep it cold, or don't keep it. Keeping it cold means refrigeration at a temperature between 40 and 50 degrees.

Food poisonings are caused by the growth of germs in food and these multiply rapidly when certain foods are kept at room temperature. In even an hour or two food may become unfit to eat without changing its taste, appearance or odor. Special care should be given to meats whether raw, precooked, or cooked, fish, milk, salad dressing, cream fillings, custards, puddings and gelatin preparations.

Keep cooked left-overs under refrigeration at all times.

CHILDREN HELPED TOWARD BETTER RELATIONSHIPS

The Detroit Orthopedic Clinic at 5477 Woodward, Detroit, a Park Drive agency, provided needed treatment to four children from Farmington during the past year, according to figures compiled by the United Community Service.

The Farmington children were among 1,800 physically handicapped youngsters under 21 years of age who received care and treatment from the clinic during 1954. This treatment ranged from full-time hospitalization in the Hospital for Children to supervision by doctors and therapists at the clinic of patients brought for occasional check-ups.

In addition to medical services, the clinic provides training case workers who supervise the child's training and development. Aid assist his family in all material plans for his care.

These trained workers work with the family to overcome potentially serious and complicated emotional and social problems which often accompany physical handicaps.

The Hospital School is equipped with special facilities used for treatment in polio cases and it offers exceptional care to youngsters with cerebral palsy.

Leeder, director of the division of disease control, records and statistics for the Michigan Department of Health.

He said application for birth records can be made to the local registrar of the city or village in which a person is born or to the county clerk's office of the county. If it is more convenient, application can be made directly to the Michigan Department of Health.
