PLAYGROUND AREA AT JUNIOR HIGH BEING ENLARGED

Work was begun this week on the clearing and grading of the area east of the Farmington Junior High School building on Thomas Street in preparation for the expansion of playground facilities.

The leveling of the 200 by 300 foot area is a part of the overall repair and maintenance program now being conducted by the Farmington School District. Other projects include the erection of new light fixtures in the gymnasium building classrooms, as well as the installation of a new hot water heater in the Ten Mile School and the leveling and grading of playgrounds at a number of the elementary schools.

SAFE WATER NEEDS GOOD CITY CONTROL

Millions of Michigan people drinking water from municipal systems "have the best assurance possible that the water is safe for their families, even though it's sometimes not easy to keep it that way," the Michigan Department of Health said this week.

Dr. Albert E. Heustis, State Health Commissioner, cited the recent "poison water" episode in Utica as an example of how industrial growth adds to the problem of trying to keep water pure for home use.

In Utica, water was contaminated by chromium waste entering the Clinton River upstream from the city through the old sewer system. Utica residents had to carry water from tank trucks until the polluted water passed the town.

Dr. Heustis said officials of Utica, Pontiac and Macomb County "can be commended for their prompt action in taking steps to protect Utica residents when the contamination was discovered. The main issue," he said, "is to prevent such contamination from happening again."

Health department engineers and specialists said potentially harmful amounts of contaminating poisons should be kept out of the sewer systems and water courses by "using every possible precaution and safety device."

"But we know that in spite of the best that can be done, accidents and maybe even willful negligence will penetrate our defenses," he said. "So water systems should protect themselves as best they can by good procedures and by providing extra storage capacity or stand-by connections to cope with emergency situations."

Publication Available To Michigan Anglers

Anglers will want and can get free "Fishes for More Fishermen," a 48-page Conservation Department publication fresh off the press.

The booklet sums up in a neat, printed package highlights of work the Department is doing to provide a growing Michigan population with fishing now and for the future.

Included are sections on lake and stream improvement, research work and results to date, the public fishing site program, reasons for and use of laws and regulations and the background of today's basic fish management thinking.

(Continued from Page 1A) company to test the new alignment to be sure it is in readiness for use after August 21, Maitrer explained. He said that after the change-over, Farmington one and two party telephone users would be able to dial direct to telephones in more than 85 other Michigan communities as well as to 24,000,000 telephones in 11 other states. Four party and party customers will be changed to the type of service desired as soon as possible after the change-over, Maitrer stated.

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Construction To Get Under Way Soon On Farmington - Brighton Expressway

An early start of construction work on the Brighton-Farmington expressway has been signalled by Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler with the announcement that bids for the first project to be let on the expressway will be opened August 3 in Lansing. The project is a bridge which will carry Twelve Mile and Beck Roads over the expressway, two miles north of present US-16.

The Twelve Mile and Beck Roads structure will consist of four, rolled-beam spans totaling 255 feet in length with a 48-foot wide roadway and three-foot-wide sidewalks on each side of the span. There will be facilities to enable traffic to get on or off the expressway at this point. Completion date for the project is June 15, 1956.

The expressway, when completed will start at US-23 just east of Brighton and extend 21 1/2 miles to a connection with US-16 east of Farmington near Middlebelt Road. It will replace the present US-16 between those two points. The estimated cost is \$11,000,000.

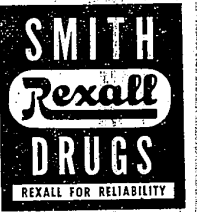
Commissioner Ziegler said the Highway Department hopes to have under contract the four-lane, divided roadway and all of the 15 other bridge and grade separation projects required on the 16.75 mile long section between Kent Lake and the connection with present US-16 east of Farmington before the end of 1955. Every effort is being made to obtain the necessary right of way to make this accelerated schedule possible.

On this section, in addition to the Twelve Mile and Beck Roads separation, expressway structures will be constructed at the Haron (Clinton parkway just west of Kent Lake, at Milford, South Hill, Old

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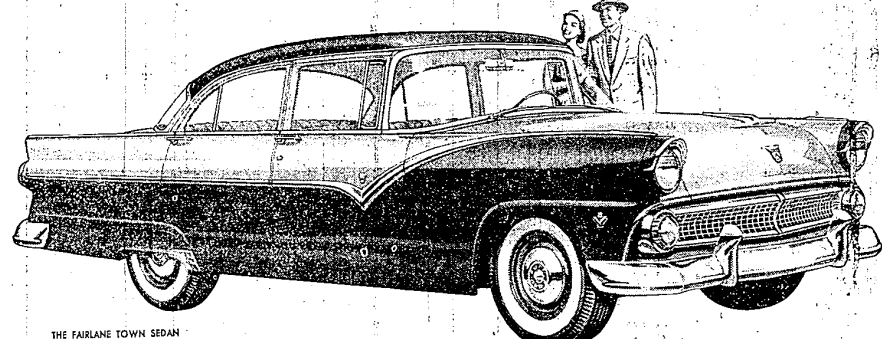

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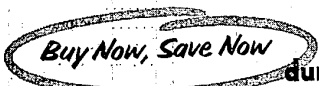
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
