The City Council met at 7:30 p.m. and the agenda was read. The City Manager reported that the subdivision had offered to fill Salley's property without charge. Salley stated that his backyard was 18 1/2 feet higher than the grade of Shawassee Street with the exception of the natural drain which has existed for years in rear of his property.

The City Manager agreed to submit a written report to the Council on the details of the proposed sidewalk construction along Shawassee between Powers and Prospect, along Powers between Ten Mile and Shawassee, and along Shawassee between Powers and Prospect. The Council stated that the erection of grade gates will be completed this week along Shawassee between Powers and Prospect, so that individual property owners can begin construction.

A letter was read to the Council from the Oakland County Road Commission to the effect that a graded survey would be made on Ten Mile between Orchard Lake and Farmington Road as soon as possible. The Council had requested that the check be made.

Councilman Harvey Chapman suggested that some type of street signal be devised to warn residents against use of outside water in case of a sudden emergency. It was decided to consider the matter and discuss it in more detail at the next meeting.

DEVELOP METHOD OF CATCHING DEER WITHOUT INJURY

Michigan Wildlife workers are developing a new method of catching deer and if it works, they will have solved one of the most headache problems in deer research.

The method depends on a new drug, fast-acting, and a special carbon dioxide gun. The drug knocks out the deer temporarily. Placed in a special hypodermic cartridge and fired from the gun, the drug can be used to catch deer in the woods without injury.

The problem of luring and studying deer with the new gun showed live trap is the deer's own shyness reluctant to cooperate. While this sort of tagging goes on, wildlife workers have to handle the animal with great caution to prevent injury to themselves and the deer.

So if the method proves out, wildlife workers will be able to go out and catch their tag plans, choose their targets and accomplish the whole study procedure quickly and with little danger.

The method is being studied at the Conservation Department's Houghton Lake wildlife station.

ALL-TIME HIGH STATE BUDGET AUTHORIZED

Michigan began a new fiscal year on July 1 with an all-time high in total authorized expenditures - \$851.3 million.

This total is 12 per cent, or \$90 million, higher than the expenditures authorized for fiscal 1954-55. Most of this increase is the result of higher appropriations for schools and the \$35 million in highway construction which is expected to produce.

Only 32 per cent of the total anticipated expenditures were directly subject to legislative disapproval through the general fund. The legislature was required to authorize the remaining 68 per cent from various restricted funds because of constitutional requirements or because of the action of previous legislatures.

Deciding whether the governor's office or the legislature is responsible for this year's higher expenditures is a toss-up. Technically, the legislature approved spending \$24.7 million more than the governor recommended, chiefly because the governor favored a bonding program to pay for new highways. Instead, the legislature voted to raise the gas tax and speed the process. Considering the general fund alone, the legislature reduced the governor's recommended budget of \$292.2 million to \$273.1 million. Even with this reduction, the total is \$18.7 million higher than last year.

Increased general fund appropriations over last year were made for every state function and capital outlay - \$5 million (the governor advocated a \$21.8 million increase). In spite of these higher appropriations, the legislature cut each function below the governor's recommendations, except for welfare and education.

Money to finance the increased expenditures is expected to come from the changed formula and added millage of the business activities tax (\$21.3 million), some increases in other state revenue sources, and a 1954-55 surplus of from \$1.8 to \$3.1 million. Partially offsetting these are losses because of a constitutional change in sales tax distribution.

The 1955-56 general fund outlay is expected to exceed income by \$4.7 million, unless revenues increase or the \$3 million surplus materializes. This marks the first time since 1952 that the legislature has approved an out-of-balance budget.
