Having been chosen as psychiatric aides of the month for the past year, they were honored with a group of other ladies picked from the group as psychiatric aides of the year. Each month one representative from each ward at the hospital elects a male and female aide of the month. Once each year the psychiatric aides of the year are chosen from that group.

The aides are elected for the honor because of their ability and popularity with the patients, their obligability to various situations, their cooperation and good will in the patients' behalf, and the understanding of problems, which arise from time to time.

A defense bond is awarded each side of the year and a picture of one of the aides is placed in the lobby of the hospital each month.

KEEP PENCILS, PAPER, PINS IN HANDY SPOTS

Pins and needles, and paper and pencils are the little things that make running a household easier. And running a home can be easier still if these small pieces of equipment are placed at strategic spots in the house, says Esther Everett, assistant professor of home management and child development at Michigan State University.

Extra brooms and dustpans, for instance, can save steps if kept in several places where they will be used — front hall, basement and back door.

Spare needles, thimbles, scissors and thread for light mending can be kept at the ironing board as well as the sewing machine. Miss Everett says, if you clip magazines or newspaper articles and recipes, another pair of scissors can be kept near where you read the material.

Miss Everett also suggests keeping postcards and a pen near the radio or television set for making requests by mail. Personal note pads are handy for taking telephone messages and making kitchen shopping lists.

DEVISE NEW PLAN FOR BLOODMOBILE VOLUNTEER HELP

Oakland County Chapter of the American Red Cross has devised a new plan of interest to prospective bloodmobile volunteer workers.

Many citizens with limited time can take part in the county's volunteer activities. If enough volunteers can be recruited, one six hour pay per month per worker will keep the mobiles well staffed.

Less than a day of training to be held late in September will qualify volunteers for work on the winter's schedule of mobiles, according to Mrs. John Logan of Royal Oak, chairman of service groups.

Duties on the mobiles include reception and registration of donors and assistance to nurses.

In the past, except for mobile registration, workers had to be in one of the Red Cross service groups. Much longer training periods were held for these groups.

Mrs. John Blanchard of Bloomfield Hills, chairman of the blood advisory committee for the county, points out that this arrangement will enable specialized workers to do the jobs for which they are trained.

Blood advisory committee members, Mrs. Norman McGeater, Mrs. Edward Schenck, Mrs. Oscar Koshkinn and Mrs. Adolph Magnus have decided to place more responsibility on area mobile chairman.

It will be the job of these chairman, during the coming months, to study the needs in their respective areas and schedule mobiles and recruit donors so that 100 units per mobile can be reached.

CHILD GUIDANCE CLINIC SERVES OAKLAND COUNTY

For better understanding of the availability of its service, the Oakland Child Guidance Clinic is the new name selected last week by the board of directors of the Pontiac Child Guidance Clinic located at 113 Franklin Boulevard, Pontiac. The clinic was established ten years ago to serve Oakland and five adjacent counties. As the state program of child guidance has expanded, new clinics have taken over the other counties.

"This change is intended to eliminate confusion about the area served by the clinic," explained Dr. Robert J. Mason, chairman of the board. "With the opening of the Stromb Child Guidance Clinic last month, we are now able to devote our service exclusively to residents of Oakland County."

"Also, the custom of naming a clinic after the city or town in which it is located has apparently led some people to believe that this clinic's services were available only to the residents of Pontiac. The new name is intended to reflect the entire area served by the clinic."

The Oakland Child Guidance Clinic, with an experienced, technically trained staff directed by Miss Madeline Hall, offers diagnostic and treatment service to help emotionally disturbed children who have habit, personality or behavior difficulties, in becoming well-adjusted members of their community.
