case of the Township such a millage increase would have to be approved by the voters. Tennant pointed out that the present budget for library purposes was approximately equivalent to the millage tax, and thus no direct tax levy would be necessary. The tax levy or its equivalent would produce about \$14,500 per year, based on the assessed valuation.

It was pointed out that although the estates are located in the City and the money is being administered by the Council, the funds constitute a gift and do not come from tax revenue.

Under a new law passed by the recent session of the State Legislature, City and Township or other municipalities can petition the State Librarian for the establishment of a Library District for purposes of organization and administration. The special three-man committee has been directed to contact the State Librarian immediately to secure additional information on the steps to follow in establishing such a district. The committee is to report back to the City Council and Township Board within 30 days.

SECURES PRIVATE SOURCE OF WATER FOR SPRINKLING

Spencer J. Heaney, 23720 Farmington Road, announced this week that he has completed arrangements with the Civic Theatre for the use of their private well for sprinkling purposes.

Heaney stated that Edward Heller, manager of the Civic Theatre, offered him the use of the well in order to preserve the grounds around his funeral home during the emergency sprinkling ban imposed by the City. Heaney added that Heller voluntarily offered him the facilities of the private well and that all outside water being used on the property is coming from that source.

between Grand River and Nine Mile, ditching on Greening between Twelve and Thirteen Mile, and the cutting of roads on Township and County Roads. The Board accepted the recommendations and agreed to take them under advisement. They also agreed to move to appropriate \$15,000 to the Road Commission for maintenance during the balance of the year.

Action was taken formally adopting three zoning amendments. The changes include the rezoning of property on the east side of Orchard Lake Road south of Farmington from Residential to Commercial, the rezoning of the Park Hill Subdivision on the west side of Orchard Lake Road north of Twelve Mile Road from Residential II to Residential III, and the rezoning of the southeast corner of Twelve Mile and Farmington Road from Residential to Commercial. Both the Township Zoning Board and the County Zoning Committee have approved the changes.

The Board also approved the rezoning of the Kristopoff property west of Orchard Lake Road and south of Thirteen Mile Road from Commercial to Residential II. The Zoning Board had recommended that the rezoning petition be turned down. Action was also taken by the Township Board declaring its intent to rezone a portion of the northeast corner of Farmington Road and Eight Mile Road from Residential to Light Industrial. The matter will be referred to the Zoning Board for recommendations and a public hearing.

In answer to a question from Mrs. Philip Newberg, member of the Citizens' Water Committee, Ernest Blanchard, Supervisor, reported that the engineers have completed a survey of possible water well sites and have selected three of the five locations proposed. Blanchard added that the Township Attorney has been directed to prepare land option forms as quickly as possible so that contracts can be let for the drilling of test wells.

The Board approved a motion authorizing the Supervisor to proceed with the hiring of a tax assessor at a salary not to exceed \$6,500 per year. Action was also taken to eliminate that portion of the Building Code requiring the plastering of attached garages.

ings is 90 per cent complete and that last time on the high school addition is being made up at an extremely accelerated rate. Only the school at Shawnee and Tuck Roads is running behind schedule. The report expressed confidence that time would be made up rapidly with subcontractors completing work at the other two elementary schools and resume operations en-masse at the Tuck Road site.

Following a discussion by the Board regarding the erection of fences at the three new elementary schools and at the junior high school, O. E. Dunkel, school superintendent, was instructed to proceed with the obtaining of bids on the project. The Board also authorized Miss Minnie Zielke, elementary coordinator, a sum not to exceed \$2,000, to be used for the purchase of furniture and other furnishings for the teachers' rooms at the three new elementary schools.

A policy was established by the Board regarding the acceptance of students not now residents of the area, but who will become resident students sometime during a current semester of school. Parents who can assure that they will be residents of the School District prior to the end of a given semester will be permitted to enroll their children as tuition students for that semester. Individual requests from two parties that their youngsters be accepted, though they have not yet taken up residence here, prompted the Board action.

Poll Reveals Decrease In Small Game Take

The Conservation Department's annual summary of hunting information, based on post-card polls and voluntary hunter reports, was released this week and shows that 1,115,000 pheasants and 1,430,000 rabbits were taken last fall and winter. The previous year, 1,125,000 pheasants and 1,534,000 rabbits were bagged.

length with a 48 foot wide roadway and three-foot wide sidewalks on each side of the span. There will be facilities to enable traffic to get on or off the expressway at this point. The completion date for the bridge project has been set for June 15, 1956.

The expressway, when completed, will start at US-23 just east of Brighton and will continue east to a connection with the present divided highway east of Farmington near Middleburg Road. The estimated cost of the project is \$11,000,000.

A request for sealed bids on the construction of a bridge to carry the Cut-Off over Farmington Road was also announced this week by the Highway Department. The bids are to be opened on Wednesday, August 14, in Lansing. Completion date for the project has been set for June 30, 1956.
