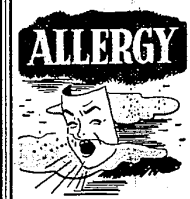
Mentor Ianni expects about 40 candidates for the varsity squad and about another 35 for the freshman team.

CHEST X-RAYS TO BE OFFERED AT FAIR AGAIN THIS YEAR

Again this year visitors to the Michigan State Fair, September 2 through 11, will have an opportunity to get a free chest x-ray, general manager Donald L. Swanson announces.

Within the ten day period last year, 1,546 persons had chest x-rays without cost at the two mobile units operated at the State Fair by the Detroit Department of Health. Dr. Joseph G. Molner, Detroit Commissioner of Health, said that of this number 169 persons were referred to their physicians for some health reason brought to light by the chest x-ray.
