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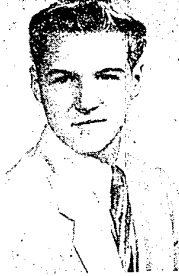

The board declared its intent to place before the voters, at a special election on October 3, a proposal for a five year extension of the present five mill tax levy for operation purposes. Action was also taken authorizing the use of a school bus for the current recreation program and to pay the salary of the bus driver. The motion stipulated that the total salary was not to exceed \$300.

Action was taken authorizing Louis Schmidt, superintendent, to serve on the joint committee on Conference and Curriculum Planning in accordance with a request from Clair Taylor, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

POLLEN COUNT HIGHEST IN STATE IN MID-AUGUST

A good breeze can blow no good — for ragweed hay fever victims, that is. The Michigan Department of Health said that in mid-August, when the ragweed pollen count reaches 100 grains per cubic yard of air per day, there are literally tons of pollen in the air, and even if a region is ragweed free, the pollen may be blown in by prevailing winds.

State health officials, getting the seasonal high of inquiries about Michigan's "hay fever relief" area, once again reviewed findings of a ten-year ragweed pollen survey in Michigan. On the bright side, the northern third of the southern peninsula and most of the northern peninsula were found sufficiently free from ragweed to be comfortable for the average hay fever sufferer. And while you may be allergic to house dust, silk, glue, certain animals, moss or even to mold, none of them times, hay fever in Michigan is caused by ragweed pollen.

The health department is glad to try to help hay fever victims, but authorities said that inquiries about job opportunities or good hotels in hay fever relief regions "are not quite in our line of business." Because in many cases it's at least possible to ease the discomfort of hay fever, the health department urged victims of the allergy to consult their doctors.

Now is a good time to set out evergreens. Be sure there is plenty of moisture in the ground and that the hole is plenty large for the plant you are setting.

In connection with the zoning question, Donald Kosmiesky, representing the Bel-Aire Civic Association, appeared before the Council in regard to the zoning of the parcel of land on the west side of Orchard Lake Road south of Lee's Lane. The association has declared its opposition to any proposal to make the parcel commercial. Kosmiesky stated that adjacent property owners were told by a real estate salesman that this parcel would be retained as a park site. At the present time it is zoned as "Suburban" and the Council stated that it has received no request as yet to rezone the property. It is, however, listed as commercial on the proposed rezoning map which is now being studied.

IN ADDITION to the letter to the Detroit City Council, it was suggested that estimates be secured to determine the cost of handling the City's sewage through the Detroit system. Tennant stated that these figures could be secured through Pate and Hiren, engineers for the interceptor project. The Council also approved a motion directing the City Manager to proceed with the capping of the master septic tank serving the Bel-Aire Subdivision so that it will function properly. It was pointed out that until the cap is properly sealed the septic tank will not operate at its full efficiency.

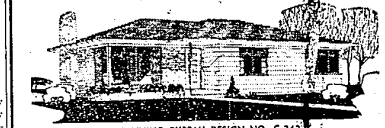

The wood of the paper birch is hard and very tough. It is extensively used for ends, shims, clothes pins, tooth picks and spoons, as well as wood pulp.

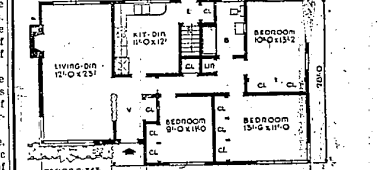
