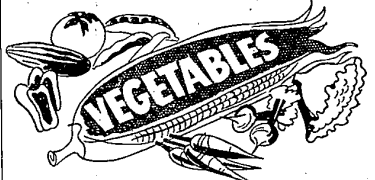
The bride's mother wore a sand nylon dress with olive green accessories and the groom's mother wore a maroon dress with black accessories. Both mothers wore orchid corsages.

### FALL SPORTSWEAR STYLES TO FOLLOW STRAIGHT LINES

Sportswear fashions for women follow a vertical silhouette direction this fall. When it comes to color, these same fashions go off in all directions. Many designers unify and dramatize the economy of line.

In this first major season of slim shapes in sportswear, the vertical look is not forgotten. Perfectly straight skirts, fitted or semi-fitted jumper sheaths, tapered pants, slims, long torso sweaters, elongated overshirts, narrow-cut blazers are one expression; slim skirts with fullness starting low at sides, or just in back is another. Fullness is of the inverted pleat variety that doesn't jut out from the figure. Hipflares for fall-skirted fashions are kept trim and pared. Finally, low-placed details in the form of partial belts, seams, pockets, and tabs, enhance the slim and long torso look for any kind of fall separates.

Fabrics become even more diversified than usual to express the slim, uncluttered silhouettes. "Blackened" tweeds occupy a top place, along with charcoal flannels. There is a tendency for "different" plaids.

The influence of knitwear is strong, with increased use of wool jersey, plain or fancy jacquard patterned types.
