Former Resident To Speak At Local Church August 28

The Reverend Marvin Turner, a longtime resident of this area and former member of the First Baptist Church of Farmington, will speak in the local church Sunday morning, August 28, at the 9:30 and 11:40 worship services, according to Pastor Gordon Northrop.

Mr. Turner, who has been pastor of the Halsey Baptist Church of Birmingham for 16 years, grew up here and was graduated from the Farmington High School. After completing his training here, he continued studies at the Northern Baptist Seminary, Chicago, and then moved to Birmingham. STATE'S SHARE OF POLIO VACCINE FUND REVEALED

Michigan will have available federal funds to pay for and administer Salk polio vaccine totaling \$1,161,000 during the period through June 1956, Senator Pat McNamara announced recently.

McNamara is a member of the Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare, which handled the principal legislation covering the grants.

Under the terms of Senate Bill 2501, Michigan can receive for expenditure before February 15, 1956, \$839,713 to be used solely for the purchase of vaccine. This is understood to be sufficient to pay for all the vaccine that will be available to Michigan between now and January.

In addition, under S. 2501, Michigan can receive \$167,943 to be used for planning and administering its anti-polio program. The sum, which also must be used before next February 15, can be used for personnel, the rental of space, purchase of needles, syringes, and so forth. Any part of this sum not used for such administrative purposes may be used to purchase additional vaccine, McNamara said.

Finally, Michigan, under the provisions of the supplemental appropriations act, is eligible for an additional \$154,350 to be used for administrative expenses incident to any programs for the distribution, control and use of polio vaccine the State may desire. This money is to last through June, 1956, and will be paid to the State in quarterly instalments.

Keep a couple of folding chairs handy for use in the very small kitchen.

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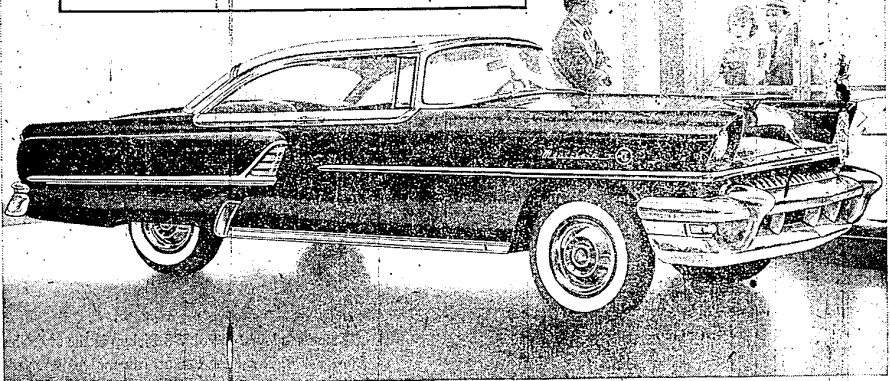
METAL BUILDINGS LIGHTER

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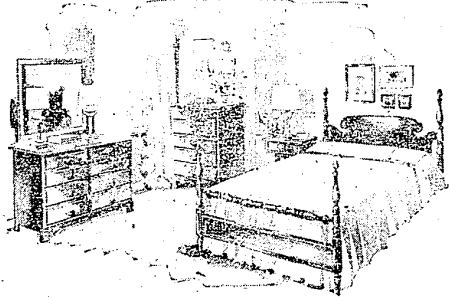
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
