Daily Hours For Small Game Hunting Revealed

Pheasant, waterfowl and other small game hunting will start on October 20 until 10 a.m. in the lower peninsula.

Waterfowl hunting opens half an hour before sunrise on October 1 and continues to half an hour before sunset that day and every day of the season except for October 20, but on that day all remain closed until 10 a.m.

The 10 a.m. opening that day, first day of the lower peninsula pheasant season, is popular with farmers and probably materially reduces opening-day trespass problems.
