Anyone may use the services of the shop, under the constitution, a token membership is a gift of time, money or goods. Any profit realized will be used to buy new items of clothing for school children under the direction of school public officials.

At first the shop will be open one day a week. All that is needed now to put the shop in operation is a place of business. Office space, first or second floor, part of a house, a heated barn or garage close to the heart of town could be used. Founders of the Farmington Resale Shop stated that they hope the shop will help cure a malady that plagues most families - growing pains. The group promoting the Resale Shop has been busy this summer collecting clothes and already has a good stock of merchandise. They have visited and studied similar shops in other cities and expressed the hope that the Farmington Resale Shop will be as much of a service to this community as it has been to others.

Starting at the center of the intersection of Orchard Lake Road and Fourteen Mile Road West, and measuring south along the center of Orchard Lake Road a distance of 609.33 feet to the point of beginning; thence South along the center of Orchard Lake Road 1134.0 feet to a point; thence West a distance of 300 feet to the place of beginning; which is a point in the center of Orchard Lake Road.

It is further resolved that within 10 days from date hereof public notice shall be given of this intent to amend the Zoning Ordinance of Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, by the publication of this resolution in the Farmington Enterprise, a newspaper of general circulation in Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan.
