the hands of the Township Clerk not later than Saturday, October 1.

A resolution was also approved establishing a procedure for the presentation of business to come before the Board. The resolution provides that matters to be brought before the Board must be presented to the Supervisor on the Friday before any regular meeting or three days before any special meeting. Blanchard explained that the purpose of the resolution was to enable the drafting of an agenda prior to the meeting. It was explained that provisions will be made in the agenda for hearing of both old and new business.

Mrs. Elise Avery, Board Trustee, stated that she had contacted the County Road Commission regarding the installation of traffic lights at the intersections of Orchard Lake Road and Twelve Mile and Orchard Lake Road and Ten Mile, and that investigations are now under way on both proposals.

Floyd Cairns, member of the Committee, stated that he had also talked to County officials and that they definitely would install a light at the Ten Mile intersection and that a new traffic survey was to be made at the Twelve Mile corner.

Caleb Moore, 30681 Peardridge, inquired as to the progress being made in connection with the case involving the Dachtile Trucking Company, which has been removing soil in the vicinity of Farmington Road and Fourteen Mile Road. Blanchard stated that all papers have been filed in the case and that the Township is awaiting the entry of the hearing on the Court docket. Moore stated that every effort be made to bring the case to a hearing as quickly as possible. Blanchard stated that the matter is expected to be heard this month.

Action was taken by the Board to table a resolution regarding the establishment of a district library, the appointment of a library board and the placing on the ballot of a mill tax levy for the operation and maintenance of a library. The Board moved to table the resolution pending clarification of several details by the Township Attorney. Members of the Board emphasized that they definitely favored the library proposal but wished to delay action until the questions can be explained.

### Michigan Copper Deposits Are Over 500 Million Years Old, Geologist Says

Upper Michigan's impressive copper deposits are over 500 million years old, according to Russell C. Hussey, professor of geology at the University of Michigan.

The copper was deposited during the Keweenaw period, as the result of two main occurrences — one associated with conglomerate rock (composed of rounded pebbles) and one with a series of lava flows.

According to the first occurrence, extremely hot copper bearing water, driven by pressure, worked its way up to the surface through volcanic rock, and deposited the copper in the spaces between the rounded pebbles of the conglomerate rock. This is the way copper is found in some of the Great Lakes mines. Professor Hussey points out.

Successive lava flows were responsible for the other type. Emerging from long cracks situated where Lake Superior now is, basaltic lava flowed out for miles and miles, again and again. Each flow cooled. Then, long after, copper bearing water worked its way up through the porous lava, and filled up the blow holes.

These blow holes, produced originally by escaping steam, were later filled with copper in solution. Sometimes large cavities in the rock were completely filled. Deposits have been found which weighed thousands of pounds. All this happened over 500 million years ago.

"Michigan's copper deposits, once among the most productive in the world, and still important, extend along the western side of the Keweenaw peninsula which just north into Lake Superior," Professor Hussey says. "The copper forms a belt from two to four miles wide and 100 miles long. Twenty-six miles of this have been highly productive. Mining began in 1845 when the belt was the premier district of North America until 1887 when Butte, Montana,
