All carillon recitals are under the direction of Dr. Maurice Garand, head of music at Christ Church.

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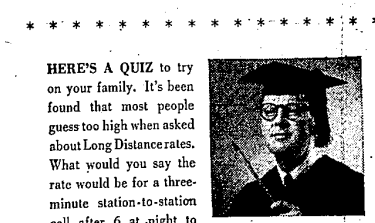

SAVINGS BOND PURCHASES INCREASE IN MICHIGAN

In the first seven months of this year Michigan sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds totaled 184,460,000 - equivalent to 60.4% of the annual quota. This represents an increase of 14.3% over sales for the first seven months of last year, and provides the basis for exceeding the year's goal of \$321.8 million, if everyone concerned will keep plugging the sale of more and larger bonds.

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
