Clarenceville Posts 7-0 Victory Over Farmington In Season Grid Opener

Staggered by a 92-degree heat wave, the Clarenceville Trojans and the Farmington Falcons met on the gridiron in an inter-community contest Friday afternoon, officially opening the football season for both schools.

The Trojans emerged as victors by a 7-0 margin. Their strong defense proved too much for the Falcons eleven to master.

Midway in the opening quarter, Trojan Halfback Bob Soop put the game on ice when he gathered in a Falcon punt and scampered 65 yards to pay dirt. The extra point was good and the Trojans led 7-0.

Two other Trojan jaunts, which would have been TD's, went for naught as both were called back due to penalties. One of the lost touchdowns was a 62-yard run by Bob Soop and the other a 56-yard trek by Gene Garbin.

The unusually warm weather was felt by both teams in the third quarter, as neither was able to move on a sustained drive.

The 200,000 are survivors of wage earners who died between June, 1940, and September, 1950. Many of these persons have had previous claims for social security benefits disallowed because the worker did not work enough under the Social Security Law as it then stood.

The 1954 amendments to the Social Security Law make possible monthly payments for eligible survivors if a worker worked as little as a year and a half under social security. "The 1954 amendments became effective a year ago and since benefits can't go back more than a year, some people may lose money if they don't get in touch with us soon," says Atwood.
