deficit financing to provide extended services as requested for this school year. Action was not taken on either proposal.
Many expressed concern at the meeting over the fact that children living in trailer parks in the township are receiving all the services of other school children but that little was being paid by their parents in school taxes. A motion was approved by the Board to investigate the possibility of changing state legislation requiring persons living in a trailer park for more than 30 days to pay additional taxes as permanent residents in a school district.
Another meeting of the School Board and the transportation committee, or representatives of the committee, will be held at some definite change in the transportation policy has been worked out.
The citizens transportation committee, comprised of four or five school trustees from each elementary school area in the district, outlined the following recommendations to the Board regarding transportation policy:
1. An immediate survey should be made of the existing transportation system to precisely define its deficiencies.
2. Make full use of existing facilities.
3. Studies should be conducted on methods of transporting school children currently used by other townships.
4. If necessary, authorize expenditures to purchase additional transportation equipment.
5. Consider the employment of an individual to spend his full time in developing and maintaining an adequate transportation system and the facilities with which to operate said system.
6. Submit all changes in routes and times to parents of affected children.
It was further recommended that school riding buses should be picked up and discharged on the right side of the road so that crossing roads would be unnecessary, and that collection points be set up within heavily settled areas rather than on main roads. Also suggested was a system whereby none would have to walk along isolated roads or empty lots and fields.
The recommendations are now being studied by the School Board and will be given further consideration.

City Council

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Two bids were received for the purchase of the 22 acres of city-owned land south of the Cut-Off and Mill Road. Action was delayed pending a review by the engineer of the sewer and water requirements of the bidders.
Mrs. Clarence Bicking, 23614, before the Council regarding the construction of sidewalk adjacent to her property. Mrs. Bicking raised an objection to the location of the proposed sidewalk along the south side of the property next to Shilwassee. It has been proposed that the walk be constructed at road level with a retaining wall along the inside of the walk. Mrs. Bicking stated that this would necessitate the removal of a number of large trees on the property.
Thomas Barber, 23187 Hawthorne, requested the Council to take action on the improvement of Hawthorne Street north of Shilwassee. The City Manager and engineer agreed to investigate the condition and to secure a cost estimate on the drainage and improvement of the street. It was proposed that the entire Floral Park area be surveyed with the possibility of setting up a special assessment district for permanent road improvement.
Two motions were made and approved authorizing the City Attorney to prepare a fence ordinance and a smoke abatement ordinance. The two proposals are expected to be ready for consideration by the Council at the next regular meeting.

were advised by salesmen that the property to be made into a park. They added that the establishment of a commercial zone would devalue their property. A representative of the real estate firm stated that he has been unable to locate any salesman who advised the property owners that the land would be made into a park. He also argued that the issuance of a commercial area would not harm the property owners.

A LEGAL opinion by Paul A. Pare, City Attorney, was read to the group in which he stated that the property should be made commercial. Pare added that, "I don't believe that the City could defend a mandamus suit to compel issuance of a building permit." He stated that the plot shows a greenbelt around "Outlet A" and that if this is not zoned commercial neither is "Outlet C" where the Bel-Aire Shopping Center is located. "Certainly the Planning Commission must have supposed 'Outlet C' to be commercial if the building plans were approved by that body," Pare stated. The attorney added that alleged misrepresentations would have to be "proved by the individual property owners as civil suits.

The developers stated that the proposed shopping center would include a barber shop, beauty shop, children's ready-to-wear dress shop, and shoe store. It was emphasized that under Commercial 1, no gas stations would be allowed except by approval of the Planning Commission. It was also stated that no restaurants, drive-ins, pool halls or bars would be allowed. The developer agreed to abide by the parking requirements as set up in the City Ordinance.
