About 31 million pounds of cheese a year are produced, mostly of the cheddar and colby types, although some Italian varieties are also made. The Federal government at present buys about three carloads a week which is graded by the bureau of dairying. In production of cream cottage cheese, Michigan places fourth among the states.

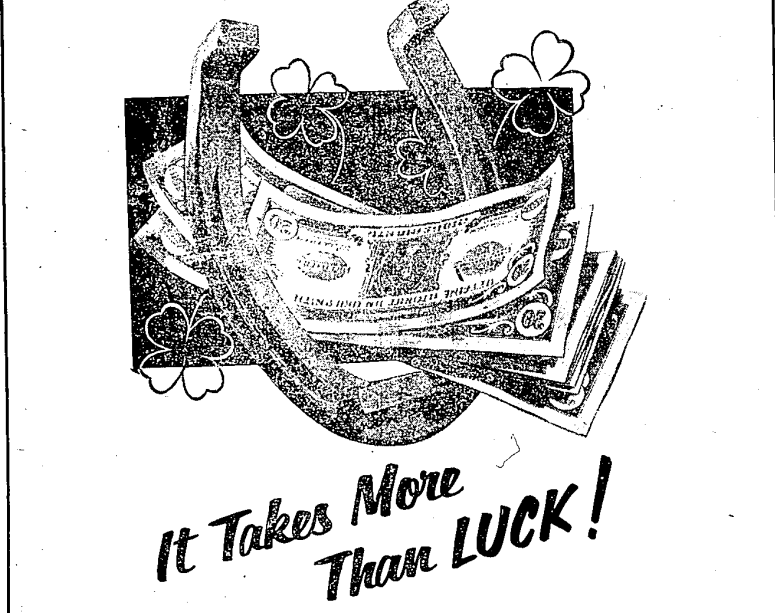
