LIVONIA SCHOOLS NOW CONDUCTING HEARING PROGRAM

The Livonia hearing screening program started Monday, October 3, at the Harrison Elementary School. The screening will continue into December and include all the Livonia public school children from kindergarten through the eighth grade.

Mrs. L. Hase, screening technician, said that approximately 5,000 Livonia school children will take the test.

Mr. E. Lounsbury, the audiologist from the Michigan Department of Health, stated that about 150 children in Livonia will be found to have medically significant hearing losses, and that probably 20 to 30 of these children will be auditorily handicapped in the classroom.

After the screening phase of the program is completed, Mr. Lounsbury will return to the Livonia schools to do a complete hearing evaluation on all the children who failed the screening test given by Mrs. Hase.

Upon the completion and results of Mr. Lounsbury's evaluation, the children with medically significant hearing losses will be referred for an otological screening examination. The parents of these children will receive a letter from the Wayne County Health Department inviting them to bring their child in for the examination. At that time, medical and educational recommendations will be made to the parents.

Mr. Lounsbury stated that from this point on the success of such a program is in the hands of the parents. If the parents follow the medical recommendation, 76 per cent of these children can expect to have either improved hearing or have their hearing restored to normal. Without medical treatment, less than 10 per cent will have normal hearing later in life.

The school program is a cooperative program between the Livonia Public Schools, the Wayne County Department of Health, the Michigan State Medical Society and the Michigan State Department of Health.

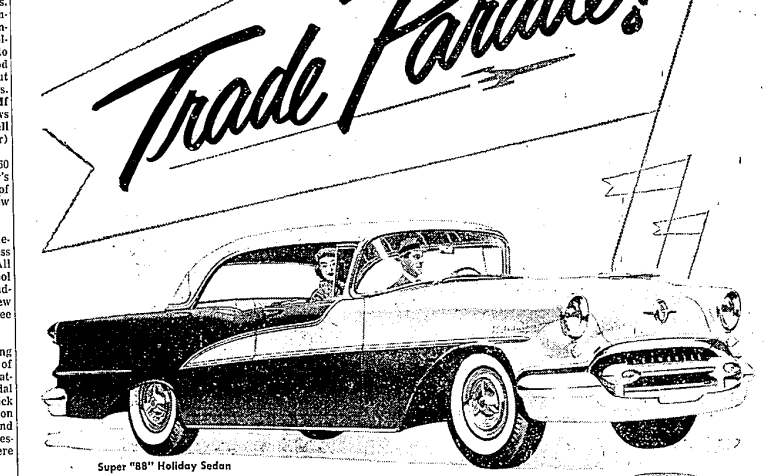
